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

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# 2008 STATEWIDE MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT UPDATE

## Energy and Environment Cabinet Division of Waste Management

### Executive Summary

#### BACKGROUND

Solid waste issues became a major focus in the late 1960s when the first solid waste legislation was passed. Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) Chapter 109, enacted in 1966, gave counties the ability to establish “109 boards” to address solid waste issues. Subsequent legislation furthered the development of county authority and responsibility for penalties for non-compliance and development of five-year solid waste plans. The five-year solid waste plans provide for access for all households to contain details on garbage collection, cleanup of illegal open dumps and litter, recycling, and solid waste education. Counties submit annual progress reports to the Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC), providing the basis for cabinet recommendations to the governor and the General Assembly.

The Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance (KRMA) program was established in 1998 to assist local governments in developing recycling infrastructure. Cost for developing recycling programs has always been an issue for local governments.

In 2002, the Kentucky Legislature enacted House Bill (HB) 174, establishing the Kentucky Pride Fund with a \$1.75 environmental remediation fee paid on each ton of waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Funding from the fee is used to characterize orphan landfills and remediate illegal open dumps. Local governments may apply for grant funding for 75 percent of the cost of cleaning illegal open dumps. HB 174 further established an annual transfer of \$5 million from the Transportation Cabinet for litter abatement activities.

In 2006, the legislature enacted Senate Bill (SB) 50, which amended HB 174 to authorize a portion of the funding generated through the \$1.75 environmental remediation fee to be used for recycling and household hazardous waste grants. The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. The cabinet has seen growth in recycling infrastructure and expects this growth to continue, in large part because of the funding authorized by the General Assembly and the support of local governments.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS

- *Fewer illegal dumpsites identified* – The number of new dumpsites identified has declined 32 percent since 2003. More than 24,400 illegal open dumps have been cleaned since 1993 at a cost of over \$62.9 million dollars, an average cost of \$2,572.43 per dumpsite.
- *Litter along public roads decreases* – There has been a 5 percent decline in litter along public roadways since 2005. The Kentucky Pride Fund, Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, Bluegrass PRIDE, Transportation Cabinet, Adopt-A-Highway, and cities and counties contributed to the cleanup of 11,668,820 pounds of litter at a cost of \$6.2 million during 2008. The average cost per pound of litter picked up decreased from 71 cents in 2007 to 55 cents in 2008.
- *Recycling* – Kentuckians recycled 34.6 percent of common household recyclables (aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newspaper, glass, and paper) in 2008. Kentuckians recycled 39 percent of all municipal solid waste in 2008, which included sludge, concrete, compost, and asphalt in addition to the common household recyclables.

- *Curbside collection* – Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained steady following legislation in 2002 requiring waste haulers and recycling haulers to register and report to each county in which they provide service. The 2008 statewide household participation rate for all collection types is 86.7 percent.
- *Waste Tire Program* – The Waste Tire Trust Fund was reauthorized in the 2006 General Assembly and will be in effect until July 31, 2010. The cabinet will be submitting a report to the General Assembly by January 15, 2010, recommending that the program be reauthorized. Tires recycled under this program are beneficially reused for purposes such as tire-derived fuel and crumb rubber for athletic fields, schools, and community parks. During 2008, Kentucky used funding from this program to recover more than 1.3 million passenger-tire-equivalents during waste tire “amnesties” across the state.
- *Crumb rubber grants awarded* – In 2008, the Waste Tire Trust Fund awarded 42 grants totaling \$994,133 to assist schools and communities in projects using crumb rubber from waste tires for athletic fields, gyms, parks, and community playgrounds.
- *The cabinet continues to make recycling a priority for the state:*
  - Thirty-one entities received recycling grants from the Kentucky Pride Fund in 2008 totaling \$1.6 million.
  - The cabinet is working with the Finance and Administration Cabinet to eliminate outsourcing of governmental waste paper for recycling. The Government Recycling Section gives presentations to all new EEC employees on the importance and benefits of recycling waste paper.
  - The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG), in association with the Division of Waste Management, Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance (KRMA) staff, and the Kentucky Pollution Prevention Center, actively began facilitating programs to further develop the commonwealth’s recycling infrastructure.
- *The Division of Waste Management’s state government office paper recycling program thrives* – The government office paper recycling program serves more than 115 agencies in Frankfort collecting office paper, computer paper, newsprint, and cardboard. State employees recycled 3,572,596 pounds of waste paper in 2008, approximately 313 pounds per state employee. Confidential document destruction provides a zero cost alternative to state and local governments.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Expand training sessions to all employees within state government on the benefits of recycling governmental waste paper. Recycling waste paper is beneficial to the environment and a savings of taxpayer dollars. Our goal is for Kentucky state government to be No. 1 nationally in paper recycling.

Promote awareness regarding the expense of littering to the commonwealth. Encourage local and state law enforcement to increase enforcement activities for criminal littering.

Obtain increased reporting from transfer stations and convenience centers to ensure adequate tracking for households participating in proper disposal of municipal solid waste, and accountability for waste disposal and environmental fee collection.


### Municipal Solid Waste Reduction

The cabinet has monitored solid waste disposal since 1993. While HB 174, enacted in 2002, eliminated the 25 percent reduction goal initiated in Senate Bill 2 in 1993, it also established policies to limit and reduce the amount of solid waste disposed through a reduction in the amount of waste generated. The bill also encouraged recycling, yard waste composting, and resource recovery.

In 2008, Kentucky experienced a 5 percent decrease in Kentucky waste disposal in Kentucky landfills and a 2 percent increase in the amount of out-of-state waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Kentucky exported 5 percent of its waste to out-of-state landfills, a decrease from 6 percent in 2007. Kentucky generated 4,522,189 tons of waste in 2008, a decrease of 278,506 tons from 2007.

Kentucky's recycling rate on common household items (aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newspaper, glass, and paper) increased from 29.5 percent in 2007 to 34.6 percent in 2008. The average recycling rate in the Southeast Region in 2006 was 22 percent, while the national average was 28.5 percent. (*The national recycling rate for 2007 had not been released at the time of publication.*) The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. As these new recycling programs become more established, Kentucky's recycling rates should continue to increase and set an example for other states.

The average cost for waste disposed at Kentucky landfills in 2008 was \$31.64 per ton. Chart No. 1 illustrates the comparison of tonnages of in-state, out-of-state, and the combined total of municipal solid waste received at landfills and the amount in tons of recycled materials in Kentucky, beginning with the base year 1994. Chart No. 2 displays the actual numbers referred to in Chart No. 1.


\*\* 2003 and 2004 Kentucky percentage increases are partially attributable to better data, due to a new state law that took effect mid-2002 requiring recyclers to register and report amounts and types of materials recycled. Kentucky municipal solid waste recycled figures are for: aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newsprint, glass and paper.

## Factors Affecting Municipal Solid Waste Collection

### Municipal Solid Waste Collection Programs

Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained relatively flat since 2003 with an average of 87.6 percent participation. Since 2003, waste haulers and recyclers have been required to register and report annually to the county the number of households utilizing collection service.

Chart No. 2 shows the number of households participating in collection systems from 2003 to 2008.




The average participation rate for collection systems in 2008 was 86.7 percent, which means approximately 13.3 percent of households (229,072 households) are disposing of their garbage illegally or are not accounted for by current tracking methods. Self-haul to a transfer station or convenience center is a legal method of disposal. However, most counties have difficulty tracking customers to this type of

facility. Increased reporting requirements from transfer stations and convenience centers is needed to ensure adequate tracking for households participating in proper disposal of municipal solid waste.

### Cleanup of Illegal Open Dumps

Since 1993, more than 24,430 illegal open dumpsites have been cleaned at a cost of \$62.8 million. Chart No. 3 shows the number of dumpsites cleaned since 2003. In 2008, counties cleaned 430 illegal open dumps at a cost of \$2.7 million. The average cost to clean each dumpsite was \$6,337. There were 475 known dumpsites remaining at the end of 2008.

Chart No. 3 shows a decrease in the number of illegal dumps identified since 2003.




Financial assistance, through the Kentucky Pride Fund Illegal Open Dump Grant program, has provided counties the incentive and the necessary financial help to identify and rid their communities of their old dumpsites.

Since 2002, the Kentucky Pride Fund (\$1.75 environmental remediation fee) Illegal Open Dump Grant program has funded the cleanup of 1,064 dumpsites at a cost of more than \$5.5 million. The fifth round of illegal open dump grants was awarded in January 2009 for the remediation of 253 dumpsites at a cost of \$2.9 million.

### Litter Abatement

In 2001, the division began tracking the cost of litter activities and the number of bags of litter collected. State litter abatement grant funding (Kentucky Pride Fund) began in fiscal year 2002. The cabinet receives \$5 million annually from the Transportation Cabinet for distribution to counties and incorporated cities for litter abatement activities.

The success of litter abatement campaigns across the commonwealth is evident in the reduction of litter being picked up along roadways. Since 2005, there has been a 4.8 percent decline in the amount of litter collected from roadways. In 2008, counties cleaned 583,441 bags of litter on 156,955 miles of roadways.



Litter collection costs totaled \$6,392,361.23, an average cost of 54 cents per pound (\$1,088 per ton). Most of the items found on roadways are plastic bottles and food containers. Litter is costly at \$1,088 per ton when compared to the average landfill disposal rate of \$31.64 per ton.

Chart No. 4 reflects the number of bags of litter collected and the amount spent on litter for calendar years 2001-2008.

### The Great American Cleanup


The Great American Cleanup, sponsored by Keep America Beautiful, runs March through May annually. The three-month period includes the cleanups sponsored by Commonwealth Cleanup Week (proclaimed the last week of March by the 1998 legislature), Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, and Bluegrass PRIDE.

Kentuckians celebrated the 11<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Commonwealth Cleanup Week during the week of March 22-28, 2009. Commonwealth Cleanup Week is the combined efforts of city and county governments, individuals, businesses, nonprofit groups, and various state agencies promoting Kentucky’s unique and scenic beauty. The success of Commonwealth Cleanup Week is seen in the level of participation and the amount of waste collected: more than 8,000 volunteers and county and state employees cleaned over 1,000 miles of road and 30 illegal dumpsites while collecting *less* waste than in 2007. Much of this success is attributable to education by the counties of our citizens about waste issues, and the results are showing along our cleaner roadways and countryside. The Great American Cleanup results are listed below for calendar years 2003 - 2008.

### Enforcement

In 1997, the cabinet began an emphasis on enforcement of illegal open dumping. Enforcement and education alerts citizens to the importance of proper management of solid waste. These efforts result in the creation of fewer illegal open dumps. In 2008, state inspectors investigated 161 open dump complaints, issued 101 notices of violation, and referred 24 cases to the Division of Enforcement. Local governments are also increasing the number of prosecution for illegal open dumping, littering, non-payment of garbage bills, and non-participation in a



county's mandatory collection system.

Chart No. 5 shows the number of county-issued citations, warning letters, and subsequent court actions for the calendar years 2003 – 2008.

### Education


Virtually all counties provide some level of solid waste education. Counties conduct local activities through schools, radio, newspapers, television, brochures, fairs, contests, etc. Civic groups, extension service, homemakers clubs, school groups, Department for Environmental Protection staff, and local nonprofit organizations all provide support through local involvement in solid waste education activities.

The cabinet hosts solid waste training and education workshops annually for county solid waste coordinators, area development district staff, environmentalists, elected officials, and interested citizens. State staff also provides assistance and ensures compliance through annual site visits to all counties, monthly newsletters, daily phone calls, and correspondence.

### County Recycling and Recycling Education Programs

County recycling data illustrate a steady increase in the statewide recycling rates of common household items such as glass, aluminum cans, newspaper, mixed and white office paper, cardboard, metal, and plastics through 2008. Chart No. 6 reflects the amount in tons of common household items recycled in Kentucky since 2000.

Beginning March 1, 2004, HB 174 required recyclers to report annually to the county the amount of municipal solid waste collected for recycling by volume, weight or number of items, and the type of items recycled.



SB 50 amended the Kentucky Pride Fund to provide grants for the development and expansion of recycling programs and household hazardous waste management. The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007 to 26 entities for a total of \$2.3 million. The new recycling grants and education efforts by local governments should result in continuing increases in the recycling rates.


### State Government Paper Recycling Program

The Division of Waste Management, Government Recycling Section, continues to operate the state paper recycling program serving more than 115 agencies in Frankfort. The Government Recycling program has been self-supporting, funding seven full-time staff positions. The Government Recycling Section offers free pickup and free document destruction of governmental office paper. The Government Recycling Section moved to its new location on Northgate Drive in June 2006. The new facility offers a secured environment to address confidentiality issues. Office paper represents 80 percent of the waste stream in

the office environment. The cabinet has been tracking the amount of governmental waste paper recycled since 1993, with more than 34.5 million pounds of paper being recycled through this program. Since 2003, state employees recycled more than 18.5 million pounds of waste paper, generating more than \$995,300 in revenue.

Since 2002, state employees recycled more than 21.7 million pounds of waste paper, generating more than \$1.38 million in revenue.

In 2008, government offices recycled 3,562,663 pounds (1,781 tons) of paper, newsprint, and cardboard – approximately 313 pounds per state employee. Chart No. 7 reflects the pounds of governmental waste paper recycled for calendar years 2002–2008.



### Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance Program (KRMA)

The Division of Waste Management’s recycling grants committee reviewed more than 40 recycling grant applications and awarded \$1.6 million to 31 cities, counties, and universities in 2008. The grants are funded through the \$1.75 Environmental Remediation Fee paid on each ton of waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. The program’s goal is to encourage recycling in areas where few recycling opportunities for citizens exist, with an emphasis on regional cooperative efforts.

The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG) reorganized in 2007 and joined with the Kentucky Pollution Prevention Center to facilitate a much needed statewide program to further develop the recycling infrastructure of the state.

Electronic scrap (e-scrap) collection is growing in the state, with approximately 40 counties offering some type of e-scrap collection. Year-round e-scrap drop-off programs are increasing across the state with 19 counties now offering them. Another 21 counties offer some type of e-scrap collection, whether periodic or an annual event. More than 3,042 tons of e-scrap was collected in 2008. The 2008 Recycling Grant program was broadened to include household hazardous waste, e-scrap, and mercury collection events. Also in 2008, the Finance and Administration Cabinet awarded an e-scrap recycling contract to a national vendor, Creative Recycling Services ([www.crsrecycling.com](http://www.crsrecycling.com)), which became effective January 1, 2009. This “all-agency” contract allows the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government, school districts, universities, and any other public (not-for-profit) convenient access to recycling. The contract provides for statewide pickup and recycling services, with no more than 5 percent (effectively 0%) of the scrap going to commonwealth landfills. This contract is unique in that the vendor pays the agencies/school districts/universities/local governments for selected items aggregated for recycling. The contract will result in the recycling of 5 million pounds per year of electronic scrap generated by government agencies and educational institutions in Kentucky.

The Glass Pulverizer Program provides counties and other entities the opportunity to pulverize stored glass with the free use of the state's pulverizer. Sizes of the pulverized glass can range from a sand-like product to nuggets suitable for use as decorative mulch. Participants for 2008 included Russell, Calloway, and LaRue counties, the U.S. Forest Service, Land Between the Lakes (LBL), and Brescia University, which collectively produced approximately 16.75 tons of pulverized glass for reuse.

Mercury collection events were held by 8 counties, with one event serving 3 counties. These events were made possible by the Kentucky Pride Fund.

The End of Life Vehicle Solutions – 2008 (ELVS), targets mercury-containing switches removed from automobiles before the autos are salvaged for scrap metal. The program collected 19.72 pounds of mercury from 8,964 switches from 57 participants.

### **Waste Tire Trust Fund**

The Waste Tire Trust Fund was reauthorized in the 2006 General Assembly and will be in effect until July 31, 2010. Funding comes from a \$1 fee on the sale of all new motor vehicles tires sold in Kentucky. The fund is used to conduct waste tire amnesty programs, award crumb rubber grants, and facilitate market development for the use of waste tires.

In 2008, tire amnesties were conducted in thirty counties in the Big Sandy, Kentucky River, Barren River, and Purchase Area Development Districts (ADDs). A total of 888,859 waste tires ("passenger-tire-equivalents," or PTEs) were recovered through these 2008 amnesties at a cost to the fund of \$878,349. This represents a 7 percent increase in PTEs recovered for these same ADDs compared with the last amnesties, conducted in 2003-04.

In 2008, the cabinet conducted a pilot project in the Green River ADD to gather data on alternative methods of waste tire management. The project began in January of 2008 and generated the removal of 302,116 PTEs at a cost of \$301,228.


In addition to these activities, eight individual waste tire sites were addressed during the year, removing 142,696 PTEs at a cost of \$141,040.

### **Crumb Rubber Grants**

From 2004 – 2008, the cabinet awarded 204 grants totaling more than \$5.6 million to local government and schools for the use of crumb rubber made from recycled tires on athletic fields and playgrounds. In 2008, the cabinet awarded forty-two grants totaling \$1 million for crumb rubber projects to be completed during the year. Funding for the crumb rubber grants comes from the Waste Tire Trust Fund.

### Educational Activity:

**COLLECTION:** The Solid Waste Coordinator (SWC) writes regular news articles for the various newspapers in the area. He also has regular radio announcement stating that collection is mandatory, along with how to sign up.  
**DISPOSAL:** The SWC utilized the local newspapers and radio to do announcements about special cleanup events and to also tell citizens that the transfer station is available for legal disposal.  
**RECYCLING/REDUCTION:** PRIDE funds a teacher to visit the different schools to talk to students about recycling/reduction. The teacher brings recyclables to school and the kids make various crafts from them. Breathitt County provides \$5,000 per year to help with this funding.  
**ANTI-LITTERING:** The SWC frequently writes about littering in his newspaper articles. He also mentions littering problems several times a year on the radio. Also twice a year the SWC participates in a 30 minute talk show on the local radio station called "To the Point" where he tells the public what is going on with the various solid waste issues in Breathitt County.  
**ANTI-DUMPING:** The SWC frequently writes about dumping in the newspaper. HE also talks about illegal dumping several times a year on the radio. When searching for names in a dump, the SWC waits until a car drives past, then holds a piece of paper up so that the passing car can see him looking for names. Sometimes the paper doesn't have a name, but passing cars don't know that. Yes, Breathitt County has a sneaky coordinator.  
**ENFORCEMENT:** The SWC makes regular visits to households not signed up on the garbage service. He issues a written Notice of Violation to these households if they fail to respond to the NOV, he files a criminal complaint. Enforcement is frequently mentioned in newspaper articles and radio announcements.  
**SITING:** No siting activity was performed during 2008.

**Newspaper Articles:** Several news articles were featured in the Garrard Central Record and the Danville Advocate Messenger that highlighted some of Garrard County's new recycling initiatives. These articles featured coverage of curbside recycling in the city of Lancaster, as well as the permanent drop-off point at the Garrard County Fairgrounds.

**ANTI-LITTERING:**

**Beautify Garrard County Campaign:** 2008 marked the second year for the Anti-Litter/Beautify Garrard County Campaign. The campaign, which started in May, once again featured the sale of the very popular "I Love Garrard County: Don't Litter" T-Shirts, which could be seen all over the county on individuals from all walks of life. Thousands of flyers were distributed to advertise the campaign and encourage citizens to do something to beautify Garrard County whether it be picking up litter, addressing a dumpsite, or educating others on the importance of keeping the county clean. The Judge/Executive once again declared the month of May as "Beautify Garrard County Month", and the campaign was featured in numerous articles in both major newspapers covering Garrard County. The Campaign culminated in the annual Anti-Litter Celebration on the Lancaster Town Square, where a drawing was held for prizes as a reward to those who undertook a clean-up project during the duration of the campaign.

**School Presentations:** Solid Waste Management incorporated Anti-Litter education into the recycling school presentations as well. Children were shown pictures and videos of the detrimental impacts of littering and dumping. Children's names were entered into a drawing in each class for Anti-Litter gear, including T-Shirt and a book bag.

**ANTI-DUMPING: News Articles/Letters to the Editor:** Anti-Dumping education was accomplished through numerous press articles detailing the clean-ups conducted by Garrard County Solid Waste. The articles included pictures of dumpsites and their proximity to water sources and wildlife. Additionally, several letters to the editor were written in conjunction with Commonwealth Cleanup Week that discouraged illegal dumping.

**Road Signs:** 4 new "\$500 Fine for Dumping" signs were installed at 4 different open-dumping trouble spots in the county.

**ENFORCEMENT:** The county solid waste ordinance clearly defines illegal dumping and sets penalties for violators. Warning letters were sent out and summonses were issued for illegal dumps and junk accumulations.

**SITING:** Since a siting ordinance was enacted in 2005, public hearings and meetings have received newspaper coverage in Lancaster and Danville.

**2008** County Annual Report Summary

**COLLECTION:** A newly updated website details all locations available to the public in Henderson County for recycling and solid waste disposal such as where residents can dispose of household waste, bulky items such as furniture, appliances and tires. Residents can log on to find out what is accepted for recycling and how to prepare recyclables for drop off. Residents can email questions to the Coordinator for specific recycling or waste disposal needs. Household hazardous waste disposal tips are also included. The city of Henderson curbside recycling continued with an increase in participation rate. Brochures are also distributed. **DISPOSAL:** Rural residents of Henderson County were given free disposal at the Henderson City Transfer as a newly offered waste disposal program. Numerous articles appeared and residents were informed of the free program. Updated recycling brochures outlined recycling drop-off locations for Henderson City and Henderson County residents as well as solid waste drop off locations and hours of operation. Phone numbers where residents may call with questions were included in the brochures as well as information on how to report illegal dumping, how to prepare recyclables for drop-off and what can be accepted at each location. The brochures also include private companies that accept recyclables from the public and solid waste haulers for county residents. The SWC conducted radio programs to promote Commonwealth Cleanup Week Tire Amnesty program, the Henderson City Curbside Recycling Program, school recycling program and answer questions from the public on a call-in basis. SWC also conducted presentations in the schools to educate students and staff of their recycling and solid waste options in Henderson County. Each school visited received coloring books, brochures and pencils made from recycled denim or paper. A newly update website.

**RECYCLING/REDUCTION:** Free electronics recycling was available to Henderson residents twice during the year. A new Pilot Tire Recycling Program sponsored by KY DWM was conducted during the year. Advertising for the program was provided by educational brochures, television news coverage, radio call in and local newspaper. Christmas Tree recycling for Henderson City and County residents was provided for the 12th straight year. Advertising in local newspaper, radio stations and TV stations. Website was newly updated and provided information for recycling opportunities in Henderson County including drop-off recycling center and city of Henderson Curbside Recycling. Grant was received to help with the school recycling program in Henderson City and County schools. Containers were purchased for the schools. An "Enviro-Fair" was held in celebration of Earth Day and completed a week-long tennis shoe recycling drive in conjunction with local TV station. Recycled materials were given to students. Free "Paper Shred Days" was advertised and held in conjunction with Earth Day and America Recycles Day. Over 12 tons of paper was shredded. Crushed glass was recycled and used in road bed construction. A brochure was delivered to 13,000 households on what can be recycled, how to prepare it and where to take it if not picked up at residences. One Rinse and Return events were advertised and conducted. Schools can now safely store plastics, newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, magazines and office paper for recycling by the Henderson County Road Department for schools outside the city limits. Schools inside the city limits were included in the Henderson Curbside Recycling Program, which is now in its sixth year of service. "The Habitat for Humanity Re-Store advertised and collected construction material and used furniture and appliances out of the landfill. They also have two collection boxes for aluminum cans. Cell phone and rechargeable battery recycling was added as a permanent recycling option for Henderson City and county residents. The county road department started concrete recycling to save money and reuse scrap concrete for road bed construction and other projects. Environmental Field Days were conducted at the Recycling Center once a week during June.

**ANTI-LITTERING:** The City of Henderson and Police Department conducted a Community Cleanup and Cookout in conjunction with Operation Community Pride lasting for two weeks where residents could place bulky waste and tree limbs on the curb for free pickup. Radio station and local newspaper promoted the cleanup. Ohio River sweep was advertised for volunteers and conducted cleanup on two miles of shoreline. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning, or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers. Fiscal Court sponsored 8 Community Cleanups at which roadways were cleaned by the Fiscal Court, Road Department, Detention Center Inmate Program, Tri-County Recycling and Operation Community Pride. Residents could set bulky waste on the curb for pickup by County Road Dept crews and inmates from the Henderson County Detention Center. Each household could also take four tires to the curb for pick up and recycling. These events were publicized through the newspaper and radio. Commonwealth Cleanup Week promoted trash pickup along roadsides by volunteer groups and road crews. Articles and pictures appeared in the newspaper. The detention center work release program cleaned all public roadways collecting trash during the entire year. This program was provided year-round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas.

**ANTI-DUMPING:** A website link to the KY DWM details what to do with hazardous waste. Residents can also find information on how to report illegal dumping either locally or anonymously through the state 1-888-NODUMPS hotline. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering, and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the state and county's illegal dumping, illegal burning or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers. Commonwealth Cleanup Week promoted citizen cleanup from illegal dumps and roadsides. Articles and pictures were published in the local paper. The detention center cleaned illegally dumped waste on public right-of-way and from public properties. This program was provided year-round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas. The SWC and Code Enforcement Officer helped educate individuals on private property on solid waste ordinances.

**ENFORCEMENT:** Henderson County Fiscal Court continued to use undercover surveillance cameras in illegal dump enforcement. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning, or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers.

**SITING:** Siting of landfills and other zoning issues are discussed monthly during regular Board of Zoning public meetings.

largest and most extensive school recycling program in the State of Kentucky. Each school was provided a large outdoor school recycling container and 30 gallon recycling containers to move the materials inside the school facilities. Schools now safely store plastics, newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, magazines and office paper for recycling. Grants continue to promote recycling education by the Tri-County Recycling Alliance for Union County. City of Uniontown received a crumb rubber grant which is recycled tires. Three drop off centers for all residents accepting plastics #1 & #2, glass, newsprint, magazine, aluminum cans, office paper/junk mail, cardboard, cereal boxes and tissue boxes. the SWC. Household hazardous waste disposal tips are included such as how to dispose of paint and medical sharps.

**RECYCLING/REDUCTION:** Webster City and County schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the state. Each school was provided a new large, outdoor school recycling container donated by a grant from the KY DWM. All schools received recycling containers in each classroom to move the materials inside the school facilities. The road department continued its new, aggressive cardboard recycling project with containers made by road crew employees and inmates. The program provides cardboard recycling boxes to businesses which were serviced by road department employee on a weekly basis. The tonnages and revenues have increased. Six schools are participating in the recycling program. Clay Elementary received a crumb rubber grant from the KY DWM for a playground. This product is made from recycled tires. A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held featuring local dignitaries and a representative from DWM. Local newspapers carried the event. Newly developed recycling brochures outlined recycling opportunities for residents at the three compaction centers. Employees at the centers passed this information out to residents. A recycling promotional insert was placed in the local newspapers and distributed to each subscriber. A pilot tire recycling program was sponsored by KY DWM. Tires of all sizes were recycled. Advertising for the program was provided by educational brochures, website, radio and TV. Tennis Shoe Recycling Program was conducted at the Webster County Schools and prizes given. Students and residents could drop off used tennis shoes for recycling at the schools. The event was sponsored by the Nike Corporation and in conjunction with Shelter Moving and Storage, local news channels and Tri-County Recycling Alliances. Over 4 large boxes of shoes were collected during the drive to be recycled into new playground surfaces and tracks. Radio advertising promoting the recycling programs and pilot tire program. Newspapers covered recycling and solid waste issues as presented to the fiscal court. Free pesticide recycling program was conducted with advertising in local newspapers. Over 28 tons of glass was recycled and crushed to be used in the nationally acclaimed glass roadbed construction project. A grant from the National Recycling Coalition and Coca-Cola was announced to help with the school recycling program. Large indoor can and bottle containers will be distributed in each of the schools. Free electronics recycling was available during one event in 2008. Radio and newspaper press releases and advertising in local newspapers. County received a state recycling grant from KY DWM. County residents received free drop-off of household waste and recycling opportunities at three compaction centers. Location and hours were publicized through the local newspapers.

**ANTI-LITTERING:** The City of Sebree conducted a Community Cleanup in conjunction with Webster County Road Department. Residents could place bulky waste on the curb for free pickup by city sanitation workers. Trees and limbs were also collected. Street sweepers helped clean litter from city streets throughout the year. The city of Providence conducted two litter cleanup events. Tri-County Recycling Alliance coordinator conducted several radio programs to promote the Commonwealth Cleanup Week and Tire Amnesty program where residents could register their dumps with the county and receive free disposal of illegally dumped tires. The road department conducted windshield surveys during Commonwealth Cleanup Week and collected all tires located on state and county right-of-way.
