2010 STATEWIDE MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT UPDATE

Executive Summary

BACKGROUND

Solid waste issues became a major focus in the late 1960s when the first solid waste legislation was passed. Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) Chapter 109, enacted in 1966, gave counties the ability to establish “109 boards” to address solid waste issues. Subsequent legislation furthered the development of county authority and responsibility for the development of five-year municipal solid waste plans and penalties for non-compliance.

The five-year solid waste plans require access to garbage collection for all households, cleanup of illegal open dumps and litter, recycling, and solid waste education. Counties submit annual progress reports to the Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC), providing the basis for cabinet recommendations to the governor and the General Assembly.

The Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance (KRMA) program was established in 1998 to assist local governments in developing recycling infrastructure. The cost of developing and expanding recycling programs has always been an issue for local governments.

In 2002, the Kentucky Legislature enacted House Bill (HB) 174 creating KRS 224.43-500 and KRS 224.43-505 which established the Kentucky Pride Fund. A \$1.75 environmental remediation fee is paid on each ton of municipal solid waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Funding from the fee is used to characterize and fund closure of orphan landfills and remediate illegal open dumps. Local governments may apply for grant funding for 75 percent of the cost of cleaning illegal open dumps. HB 174 further established an annual transfer of \$5 million from the Transportation Cabinet for litter abatement activities.

In 2006, Senate Bill (SB) 50 amended the Kentucky Pride Fund statutes, authorizing a portion of the funding generated through the \$1.75 environmental remediation fee to be used for recycling and household hazardous waste management grants. The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. The cabinet has seen growth in recycling infrastructure and expects this growth to continue, in large part because of the funding authorized by the General Assembly and the support of local governments.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- *Fewer illegal dumpsites identified* –The number of new dumpsites identified annually has declined 16 percent since 2003. More than 25,000 illegal open dumps have been cleaned since 1993 at a cost of over \$68 million dollars, an average cost of \$2,720 per dumpsite.
- *Litter along public roads decreases* – The Kentucky Pride Fund, Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, Bluegrass PRIDE, Transportation Cabinet, Adopt-A-Highway, and cities and counties contributed to the cleanup of 14,989,480 pounds of litter at a cost of \$6.9 million during 2010. The average cost per pound of litter picked up increased from 44 cents in 2009 to 46 cents in 2010.
- *Recycling* – Kentuckians recycled 29 percent of common household recyclables (aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newspaper, glass, and paper) in 2010. Kentuckians recycled 35.7 percent of all municipal solid waste in 2010, which included sludge, concrete, compost, and asphalt in addition to the common household recyclables.

- *Curbside collection* – Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained steady following legislation in 2002 requiring waste haulers and recycling haulers to register and report to each county in which they provide service. The 2010 statewide household participation rate for all collection types is 86.6 percent.
- *Waste Tire Program* – The Waste Tire Trust Fund, enacted in 1998, was extended in the 2010 Special Session of the General Assembly through HB 2 and is in effect until June 30, 2012. The cabinet submitted a report to the Legislative Research Commission on January 13, 2012, recommending that the program be reauthorized. Tires recycled under this program are beneficially reused for purposes such as tire-derived fuel and crumb rubber for athletic fields, schools, and community parks. During 2010, Kentucky used funding from this program to recover approximately 604,000 passenger-tire-equivalents during waste tire “amnesties” across the state, as part of the waste tire amnesty program.
- *Crumb rubber grants awarded* – In 2010, the Waste Tire Trust Fund awarded 14 grants totaling \$282,814 to assist schools and communities in projects using crumb rubber from waste tires for athletic fields, gyms, parks, and community playgrounds.
- *Direct grants awarded for tire recycling and disposal* – The Waste Tire Trust Fund awarded 117 grants totaling \$351,000 to assist counties with funding the recycling and disposal of waste tires.
- *The cabinet continues to make recycling a priority for the state:*
 - In preparation of the 2011-2012 Kentucky Pride Fund Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Grants cycle, the Recycling Assistance Section organized presentations throughout the commonwealth utilizing the 15 Area Development Districts (ADDs). These presentations ran from October 2010 to February 2011.
 - The Kentucky Pride Fund Recycling and HHW Grants Committee reviewed 78 recycling and HHW grant applications and awarded over \$3.5 million. Sixty-one recycling grants were awarded to cities, counties, and universities in 2010; eight of the recycling grants awarded were for regional efforts that included two or more counties. HHW grants were awarded to 14 counties.
 - The cabinet has worked with the Finance and Administration Cabinet to put recycling equipment vendors on state contract for “e-procurement.” This was the first year that recycling and HHW grant applicants could purchase equipment by using the state’s web-based purchasing process rather than by putting the project out for sealed bids. This made the process easier and quicker.
 - The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG) reorganized in 2007 and joined with the Kentucky Pollution Prevention Center to facilitate a much needed statewide program to further develop the recycling infrastructure of the state. Composed of individuals from state and local governments as well as industry, KRIG met in April 2010 at Eastern Kentucky University to discuss the gathering of recycling information for Kentucky and educational possibilities.
- *The Division of Waste Management’s state government office paper recycling program thrives* – The government office paper recycling program serves more than 115 agencies in Frankfort collecting office paper, computer paper, newsprint, and cardboard. State employees recycled

3,089,308 pounds of waste paper in 2010, approximately 246 pounds per state employee.
Confidential document destruction provides a zero cost alternative to state and local governments.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Expand training sessions to all employees in state government on the benefits of recycling governmental waste paper, which is beneficial to the environment and saves taxpayer dollars.

Expand educational efforts about Kentucky's "all state agency" electronic scrap (e-scrap) recycling contract, effective January 1, 2009, with Creative Recycling Systems for the environmentally sound recycling/reuse of the commonwealth's e-scrap (end of life computer equipment, components, and office electronics).

Continue and expand efforts to educate citizens and local government officials about the availability of state grants for litter abatement, illegal open dump cleanups, recycling infrastructure, household hazardous waste collection events, and the purchase of crumb rubber as well as other waste tire end uses.

Continue partnership with state and local law enforcement agencies on "Take Back Initiatives" for the collection and disposal of unused and expired pharmaceutical controlled substances and unwanted or expired over-the-counter medications.

Municipal Solid Waste Reduction


The cabinet has monitored solid waste disposal since 1993. While HB 174, enacted in 2002, eliminated the 25 percent reduction goal initiated in Senate Bill 2 in 1993, it also established policies to limit and reduce the amount of solid waste disposed through a reduction in the amount of waste generated. The bill also encouraged regional recycling, yard waste composting and resource recovery.

In 2010, Kentucky experienced a 6 percent decrease in Kentucky waste disposal in Kentucky landfills and a 3 percent increase in the amount of out-of-state waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Kentucky exported 9 percent of its waste to out-of-state landfills, an increase from 7 percent in 2009. Kentucky land-filled 4,191,066 tons of waste in 2010, a decrease of 161,952 tons from 2009.

Kentucky's recycling rate on common household items (aluminum, cardboard, ferrous and nonferrous metal, plastic, newspaper, glass, scrap, and paper) increased from 28.3 percent in 2009 to 29 percent in 2010. The average recycling rate in the Southeast Region in 2006 was 22 percent, while the national average was 28.5 percent. (*The national recycling rate since 2006 had not been released at the time of publication.*) The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. As these new recycling programs become more established, Kentucky's recycling rates should increase.

The average cost for waste disposed at Kentucky landfills in 2010 was \$34.58 per ton. Chart No. 1 illustrates the comparison of tonnages of in-state, out-of-state, and the combined total of municipal solid waste received at landfills and the amount in tons of recycled materials in Kentucky, beginning with the base year 2000.


Municipal Solid Waste Collection Programs

Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained relatively flat since 2003 with an average of 87.4 percent participation. Since 2003, waste haulers and recyclers have been required to register and report annually to the county the number of households utilizing collection service.

Chart No. 2 shows the number of households participating in collection systems from 2003 to 2010.

The average participation rate for collection systems in 2010 was 86.6 percent, which

means approximately 13.3 percent of households (231,401 households) are disposing of their garbage illegally or are not accounted for by current tracking methods. Self-haul to a transfer station or convenience center is a legal method of disposal. However, most counties have difficulty tracking customers to this type of facility. Increased reporting requirements and mandatory use of scales in transfer stations and convenience centers are needed to ensure adequate tracking for households participating in proper disposal of municipal solid waste. Data for multiunit housing is often not captured.




Cleanup of Illegal Open Dumps

Since 1993, more than 25,000 illegal open dumpsites have been cleaned at a cost of \$68 million. Chart No. 3 shows the number of dumpsites cleaned since 2003. In 2010, counties cleaned 336 illegal open dumps at a cost of \$2.7 million. The average cost to clean each dumpsite was \$8,190. There were 285 known dumpsites remaining at the end of 2010.

Chart No. 3 shows a decrease in the number of remaining illegal dumps since 2003.

Financial assistance, through the Kentucky Pride Fund Illegal Open Dump Cleanup Grant program, has provided counties the incentive and the necessary financial help to identify and rid their communities of their old dumpsites.


Since 2002, the Kentucky Pride Fund (\$1.75 environmental remediation fee) Illegal Open Dump Cleanup Grant programs have funded the cleanup of 1,494 dumpsites at a cost of more than \$9.1 million. The sixth round of illegal open dump grants was awarded in January 2010 for the remediation of 202 dumpsites at a projected of \$2.1 million.



Anti-litter Control Program

In 2001, the division began tracking the cost of litter activities and the number of bags of litter collected. State litter abatement grant funding (Kentucky Pride Fund) began in fiscal year 2002. The cabinet receives \$5 million annually from the Transportation Cabinet for distribution to counties and incorporated cities for litter abatement activities.

The success of litter abatement campaigns across the commonwealth is evident in the reduction of litter being picked up along roadways. In 2010, counties cleaned 749,474 bags of litter on 215,814 miles of roadways.



Litter collection costs totaled \$6,870,665, an average cost of 46 cents per pound (\$917 per ton). Most of the items found on roadways are plastic bottles and food containers. Litter is costly at \$917 per ton when compared to the average landfill disposal rate of \$34.58 per ton. Chart No. 4 reflects the number of bags of litter collected and the amount spent on litter for calendar years 2001-2010.

The Great American Cleanup

The Great American Cleanup, sponsored by Keep America Beautiful, runs March through May annually. The three-month period includes the cleanups sponsored by Commonwealth Cleanup Week (proclaimed the last week of March by the 1998 legislature), Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, and Bluegrass PRIDE. Kentuckians celebrated the 12th anniversary of Commonwealth Cleanup Week during the week of March 20-26, 2010. Commonwealth Cleanup Week is the combined efforts of city and county governments, individuals, businesses, nonprofit groups, and various state agencies promoting Kentucky’s unique and scenic beauty. The success of Commonwealth Cleanup Week is seen in the level of participation and the amount of waste collected: more than 1,000 volunteers and county and state employees cleaned over 500 miles of road and 11 illegal dumpsites. Much of this success is attributable to education of our citizens about waste issues, and the results are showing along our cleaner roadways and countryside.

Adopt-A-Highway


Kentucky has participated in the International Adopt-A-Highway Program since 1988. There are over 900 Adopt-A-Highway Groups in the state. The groups do four yearly pick ups, three scheduled and one on their own. Standard adoption is 2.0 miles with a 2 year contract. Groups include civic and community groups, business organizations and even families.

Enforcement

In 1997, the cabinet began an emphasis on enforcement of illegal open dumping. Enforcement and education alerts citizens to the importance of proper management of solid waste. These efforts result in the creation of fewer illegal open dumps. In 2010, state inspectors investigated 299 open dump complaints resulting in the issuance of 89 NOVs. Local



governments issued fewer warning letters and citations in 2010 resulting in fewer court actions related to solid waste management.

Chart No. 5 shows the number of county-issued citations, warning letters, and subsequent court actions for the calendar years 2003 – 2010.


Education

Virtually all counties provide some level of solid waste education. Counties conduct local activities through schools, radio, newspapers, television, brochures, fairs, contests, etc. Civic groups, extension service, homemakers clubs, school groups, Department for Environmental Protection staff, and local nonprofit organizations all provide support through local involvement in solid waste education activities.

The cabinet hosts solid waste training and education workshops annually for county solid waste coordinators, area development district staff, environmentalists, elected officials, and interested citizens. State staff also provides assistance and ensures compliance through annual site visits to all counties, monthly newsletters, daily phone calls, and correspondence.

County Recycling and Recycling Education Programs

Beginning March 1, 2004, recyclers were required to report annually to the county the amount of municipal solid waste collected for recycling by volume, weight or number of items, and the type of items recycled. Statewide recycling rates of common household items such as glass, paper, metal, and plastics increased from 28.3 % to 29 % in 2010. Chart No. 6 maps the recycling rate since 2000. Table 2 (page 9) shows the breakdown by recycled material.

Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance Program (KRMA)

The Division of Waste Management’s 2010-2011 Kentucky Pride Fund Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Grants Committee reviewed 78 recycling and HHW grant applications and awarded \$3.5 million. Sixty-one recycling grants were awarded to cities, counties, and universities in 2010; eight of the recycling grants awarded were for regional efforts that included two or more counties. HHW grants were awarded to 14 counties. Materials collected included E-scrap, pesticides, solvents, mercury and other HHW products found around the home. These events were made possible by the Kentucky Pride Fund. The Recycling and HHW grants require a 25 percent local match in the form of cash or “in-kind” personnel, educational activities/materials and advertising to promote the program from the cities or counties receiving the awards. The program’s goal is to encourage recycling projects that can be expected to become financially viable as well as HHW management projects, with an emphasis on regional cooperative efforts in areas where few opportunities exist.

E-scrap collection is growing in the state, with approximately 56 counties offering some type of e-scrap collection. Year-round e-scrap drop-off programs are increasing across the state with 21 counties now offering them. Another 35 counties offer some type of e-scrap collection, whether periodic or an annual event. More than 4,059 tons of e-scrap was collected in 2010. Beginning in 2008, the Kentucky Pride Fund program provided grant awards for the management of HHW, a category that includes e-scrap and mercury. Also in 2008, the Finance and Administration Cabinet awarded an e-scrap recycling contract to a national vendor, Creative Recycling Services (www.crserecycling.com), which became effective January 1, 2009. This “all-agency” contract allows the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government, school districts, universities, and any other public (not-for-profit) agency convenient access to recycling. The contract provides for statewide pickup and recycling services; with effectively zero percent (0%) of the scrap going to commonwealth landfills. This contract is unique in that the vendor pays the agencies/school districts/universities/local governments for selected items aggregated for recycling. Over 3,083,510 pounds (1,541 tons) of e-scrap have been collected from 496


agencies/locations and refurbished or recycled in an environmentally sound and data secure manner year to date (January 2010 to December 2010). Payments to generators have netted over \$87,400.

The End of Life Vehicle Solutions – 2010 (ELVS) targets mercury-containing switches removed from automobiles before the autos are salvaged for scrap metal. The 110 participants collected 15.60 pounds of mercury from 7,090 switches.

State Government Paper Recycling Program

The Division of Waste Management, Government Recycling Section, continues to operate the state paper recycling program serving more than 115 agencies in Frankfort. The Government Recycling program has been self-supporting, funding seven full-time staff positions.

Since 2002, state employees have recycled more than 27.9 million pounds of waste paper, generating more than \$1,897,589 in revenue. In 2010, government offices recycled 3,089,308 (1,545 tons) of paper, newsprint, and cardboard – approximately 246 pounds per state employee. Chart No. 7 (page 10) reflects the pounds of governmental waste paper recycled for calendar years 2002–2010.



Waste Tire Trust Fund

The Waste Tire Trust Fund was extended in the 2010 Special Session of the General Assembly through HB 2 and is in effect until June 30, 2012. The cabinet submitted a report to the Legislative Research Commission on January 13, 2012, recommending that the program be reauthorized. Funding comes from a \$1 fee on the sale of all new motor vehicles tires sold in Kentucky. The fund is used to conduct waste tire amnesty programs, award crumb rubber grants and facilitate market development for the use of waste tires.

In 2010, tire amnesties were conducted in 20 counties that make up the Buffalo Trace, FIVCO and Lake Cumberland Area Development Districts (ADDs.) A total of 603,990 passenger-tire-equivalents (PTEs) were recovered at a cost of \$574,203. This represents an 18.4 percent decrease in PTEs recovered from the same counties during the last amnesty conducted 2005-2007.

Two off-site tire cleanups were conducted in Bath and Lee counties in 2010. A total of 12,217 PTEs were removed from these sites at a cost of \$13,729.65.

The Cabinet introduced a new \$3,000 waste tire removal grant in 2010. Counties may apply for this annual grant to be used during the fiscal year on the removal of waste tires between amnesties. Currently it takes 3.5 years for the Cabinet to conduct amnesties in all 120 counties.

Crumb Rubber Grants

From 2004 – 2010, the cabinet awarded 229 grants totaling more than \$6.1 million to local government, schools, daycares, churches and other entities for the use of crumb rubber made from recycled tires on athletic fields, playgrounds, walking trails, landscaping, gymnasium floors, etc. In 2010, the cabinet awarded fourteen grants totaling \$282,814 for crumb rubber projects to be completed during the year. Funding for the crumb rubber grants comes from the Waste Tire Trust Fund.

were taken from the local newspaper that promotes local recycling events. Newspaper articles also educate the public on local recycling activities. The Future Farmers of America (FFA) assist during the well promoted Spring and Fall Steel/White Goods Recycling Roundup at Wal-Mart. Several school groups have visited these events to learn first hand about recycling. Homemakers collect and recycle pop can tabs to benefit the Children's Miracle Network. Two collections are offered to the agriculture community for the rinse and return program for chemical containers and containers are chipped in October.

ANTI LITTERING: Litter is a topic that is routinely included in presentations conducted by the solid waste coordinator. Educational Activity:

The Garrard/Lincoln Solid Waste Management Area continued its strong commitment to public education in 2010 with a primary focus on schools. In partnership with Bluegrass PRIDE, numerous presentations on recycling and environmental stewardship were conducted at schools in both counties and were supplemented by literature and anti-litter giveaways such as pencils and t-shirts.

Garrard County High School received a grant from Bluegrass PRIDE to implement a comprehensive recycling program that includes both participation in recycling pick-up services and education of teachers and students about the importance of recycling. The regional recycling center in Lincoln County hosted numerous school groups who toured the facility and watched presentations in the on-site classroom.

The management area also participated in numerous public events throughout the year. Thanks to local volunteers and staff from Bluegrass PRIDE, the Solid Waste Department had a presence at nearly every public event in 2010, including Garrard County's Earth Day Festival and the heavily-attended Tobacco Cutting Contest. The Solid Waste Management booth at all public events provided literature and information on collection, disposal, recycling, and anti-litter/anti-dumping in the management area and also featured several anti-litter/recycling giveaways such as pens, pencils, flyswatters, and portable ashtrays. The Solid Waste Department and local volunteers also created a recycling themed float that was featured in the Tobacco Festival Parade.

The Solid Waste Department also conducted several presentations for civic groups in 2010. The presentations featured an outline of solid waste services available to residents, the financial impact of littering/illegal dumping, and locations of various recycling and bulky item drop-offs in the two counties.

The Solid Waste Advisory Committee in Garrard County conducted the 5th Annual "Beautify Garrard County Campaign" in 2010. This campaign once again used several media resources, flyers, and public events to encourage residents to clean their property or road frontage, eliminate a dump, or help a neighbor abate a nuisance. Each documented beautification activity qualified the participating individuals for prize drawings held at the annual "Beautify Garrard County Party on the Square" in June. Among the prizes were a free stay at a Kentucky State Park, a free pontoon rental on Herrington Lake, \$100 cash, and free tickets for the Belle of Louisville. The anti-litterthemed Party on the Square attracted more than 1,200 people on the third Saturday in June.

The popular anti-litter "Trash for Cash" program was conducted in Lincoln County during the week of Earth Day. 75 non-profit groups cleaned county roadsides for a donation from the year's Litter Abatement Grant funds. Each group submitted letters to the Solid Waste Department outlining what they had learned about littering during their experience. Also during the month of April, many downtown businesses allowed their employees to wear the popular "I Love Lincoln County: Don't Litter" t-shirts on Fridays to promote Earth Day and show support for the non-profit groups working to clean up county roadsides.

COLLECTION: Updated website details all locations available to the public for recycling and solid waste disposal. Residents can email questions to the SWC for specific recycling or waste disposal needs. Information where residents can dispose of household waste, bulky items such as furniture, appliances and tires is provided on the website and in the brochures. Household Hazardous Waste disposal tips are also included which tells residents how to dispose of paint and medical sharps. Henderson City Curbside Recycling continued with strong participation. The city of Henderson provided a weekly, municipally operated waste collection program and private haulers continued collecting solid waste from city residents as well. County residents were given the option of several residential and commercial franchised haulers to choose from to pick up waste at the curb or roadside. County residential waste haulers are franchised and are required to provide 30-90 gallon carts with wheels and attached lid to collect and store the waste. Information was advertised through publications, brochures, radio, newspaper articles, phone calls and various media outlets.

DISPOSAL: Updated website details all locations available to the public for recycling and solid waste disposal. Residents can email questions to the SWC for specific recycling or waste disposal needs. Rural residents of the county are allowed free disposal at the Henderson City Transfer as a feature of a waste disposal program brokered through cooperation between city and county government. Updated brochures outlined recycling drop-off locations for Henderson City and Henderson County residents as well as solid waste drop off locations and hours of operation. Phone numbers where residents may call with questions were included in brochures, as well as information on how to report illegal dumping. The SWC sent press releases to local radio station and the local newspaper to promote the Henderson County Curbside Recycling Program, school recycling program and answered questions from the public. The SWC also conducted presentations in the schools to educate students and staff of their recycling and solid waste disposal options in Henderson County.

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: A grant received from DWM was used for recycling education and equipment necessary to enhance recycling efforts. The SWC presented educational materials and information to students in the elementary, middle and high schools. Free electronics recycling was available to Henderson residents. The Henderson County High School and Tri-County Recycling Alliance coordinated an electronics recycling event in cooperation with Greenworks Recycling in Owensboro. Residents from Henderson City and Henderson County could participate and could drop-off, free of charge all residential electronic items. Educational brochures and materials made from recyclables were distributed to participants and visitors to the Recycling Center. Local radio, newspaper and television outlets promoted the recycling efforts and raised recycling awareness. Tires were collected and recycled at the Recycling Center. Christmas Tree recycling for Henderson City residents was provided for the 14th straight year. Advertising for the programs ran in the local newspaper, radio stations and television. A new school education program began in 2010. Newly updated website provided information for recycling opportunities in Henderson County including the drop-off recycling center and the city of Henderson Curbside Recycling program. A grant from the National Recycling Coalition and Coca-Cola continued to benefit the school recycling program in Henderson City and County schools. Henderson Mayor and city commission continued supporting the Henderson School Recycling program which provides free pickup of materials. Henderson County Fiscal Court and road department personnel provided free pickup of recycling materials in the rural schools. Two free "paper shred days" were held. Mass mailings of City of Henderson recycling brochures was accomplished by insertion into utility billings. Weekly reminders of recycling routes appeared on the front page of newspaper. A new school education program was introduced in 2010 - the ABC "A Bench for Caps" school recycling program is a partnership between school children, Tri-County Recycling Alliance, Kentucky Division of Waste Management and Green Tree Plastics, - a "hands-on", real life experience in acquiring conservation habits for a lifetime of green living. Students collected 250 pounds of metal-free plastic caps from soft drink bottles, detergent bottles, butter tubs, etc to exchange for a 6' playground bench made from Green Tree Plastics. The city and county schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the state. Each school was provided a large, outdoor school recycling container, receptacles for can and bottle recycling, as well as recycling containers in each classroom. Henderson County recycles its crushed glass in new road bed construction projects. Other items recycled are cell phone and rechargeable batteries, used motor oil, hydraulic fluids, vegetable oils and transmission fluids. The farm pesticide recycling program was conducted.

ANTI-LITTERING: Solid Waste brochures outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering and to get more information about haulers. Henderson County Detention Center Inmate Program provided equipment and personnel to work to cleanup litter and illegal dumps along public right of ways. The inmate program cleaned all public roadways collecting trash from public properties. This program was provided year round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas. The city of Henderson also conducted a Spring Cleanup for two weeks in April. Residents could place all bulky waste on the curb for free pickup. Trees and limbs were also collected by the city. Promotion on local radio and in local newspaper.

ANTI-DUMPING: Newly updated website with link to Kentucky DWM with details on what to do with hazardous waste and to report illegal dumping either locally or anonymously through the state 1-800-NODUMPS hotline. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the state and county's illegal dumping, illegal burning or littering ordinances. The brochures included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers. The detention center cleaned illegally dumping waste from public right of ways and from public properties. This program is provided year round to help deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas.

Educational Activity:

COLLECTION: A) Beginning February 1, 2010 the franchise agreement was renewed for another five year period with Industrial Disposal for residential garbage collection. The ordinance that established the franchise required commercial entities to fold into the franchise at that time. The changes that were negotiated under the new agreement for residential collection are: residents can have up to two roll carts provided by Industrial Disposal at no additional charge. (Old contract allowed for a \$1.00/mo/cart rental fee.) Volume limits are relaxed during the weeks before, of and after Christmas to include New Years Day, and the weeks of and after Thanksgiving, July 4th, Memorial Day and Labor Day.

The price per month decreased slightly from the previous agreement and is firm for the first two years of the contract. In the third, fourth and fifth year, a flat 3% increase will be applied.

The two-day junk drop off held in the spring was eliminated. Residents may still set out one bulk item per week but if they have multiple items, the agreement allows them to use Valley View Landfill located about 8 miles from LaGrange at NO charge. This includes bulk (junk) items as well as extra garbage or yard waste.

The nine county-owned facilities that require waste services are now provided by Industrial disposal at NO charge. Prior to this, the county's cost for waste disposal was \$18,000/year.

Industrial Disposal was also required to send "New Trash Guidelines" to every resident under the franchise prior to the start of the new contract. When a new customer signs up for service in the franchise area, they are mailed the guidelines that are posted on Oldham County's website (see attachment).

B) The Solid Waste Ordinance that established the franchise required that all commercial entities fold into the franchise agreement February 1, 2010. This does not include industrial (manufacturing facilities) or State or Federal entities. The commercial rates include all environmental and fuel surcharge fees. I believe about 90% of the businesses saw a decrease in their monthly rates - some quite substantial. Industrial Disposal furnishes all necessary dumpsters or roll carts. The rates are scheduled to remain the same for the first two years of the contract. In the third, fourth and fifth years of the contract, an annual increase of 3% will be applied on the anniversary of the contract date. The Oldham County Chamber of Commerce sent out a blast email advising businesses of the changes. Packets were prepared and Industrial Disposal sales staff visited or phoned the commercial entities affected to advise of rate schedules which included communication from Oldham County explaining the franchise. (See Attached).

DISPOSAL: A) Residents are encouraged to recycle metal items such as white goods, etc. B) We also have information on our website about proper disposal of motor oil, antifreeze, compact fluorescent light bulbs, styrofoam peanuts and tires. C) Residents were also advised whenever inquiries were made that woody waste could be taken to Natural Products for reuse which is a Permit-By-Rule composting facility. D) The Oldham County Extension Office held three Private Pesticide Applicator Training Seminars in January, June and December 2010, a Common Landscape Pests and their Control Class in May 2010 and an Integrated Pest Management & Pesticides Class in November 2010. These seminars and classes educated users about following manufacturer's labels for proper application to minimize contamination and maintaining the appropriate ratio of chemicals for the need.

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: A) The Conservation District had 100 fourth grade students participate in Earth Day. Students learned about environmental issues - water, soil and recycling. B) The Extension Office held a Rinse and Return Program for Pesticide Containers in August. C) In March and April 2010, the Extension Office held Master Grazer Seminars (water protection) to educate farmers about rotating livestock in pastures to allow vegetation time to grow and replenish the nutrients in the soil. D) In September 2010, Industrial Disposal began offering a program to encourage more residents to recycle curbside. The program is called RecycleBank and is an incentive-based initiative to motivate residents to recycle. Residents earn points each time they recycle. There is no cost for the resident to participate and projections are a resident could earn over \$110/year in reward dollars to be redeemed at local and national retailers and businesses. The current cost to recycle curbside is \$54 per year. Letters and flyers were sent to Industrial Disposal customers advising of the new incentive program. An article was also in the Courier-Journal and a presentation was made at Fiscal Court which airs on Cable Channel 25 about the RecycleBank initiatives. (see attached). E) The Oldham County Extension held a Regional Beef Field Day/Seminar in October 2010 on animal mortality composting. Oldham County Animal Control is looking into this as an option for carcass removal which is now being facilitated by a private contractor. F) The County also bales mill-ready cardboard and live load semis at the Center. In 2010, we recycled 149.58 tons of baled cardboard. G) The Extension Office held a Rain Garden Seminar in October 2010 to teach residents about collection and absorption of contaminants into the soil rather than runoff into waterways.

ANTI-LITTERING: A) 44 different non-profit organizations participated in our State-funded Anti-Litter Campaign. Groups who chose to segregate recyclables received an additional stipend. Each group was asked to write a letter to the editor of our local newspaper about their experiences. Of the State funds allocated to the Litter Abatement Program, 93% went to the non-profit organizations. I do not believe there is any better way to impact, particularly these young people who are the primary participants, of the negative affects of littering. Because of participating in litter pickup, it is hoped they will not be future litterers when they reach driving age or will think twice about doing so because of participating in this program. See attached. B) Pencils made from recycled denim with the message ERASE LITTER IN OLDHAM COUNTY and bookmarks made from recycled yellow pages and plastic and ones made from recycled currency and plastic with the message Be A Bookworm; Not A Litterbug! Were used as handouts to bring awareness to the County's campaign. They were also used at events and presentations as given out at our recycling center. (enclosed). C) Oldham County Police produced an anti-litter PSA in 2008 which advised the public if someone is observed littering they would be ticketed and incur a \$500 fine and possible court costs. This continued to run on our Government Channel 25 in 2010.

ANTI-DUMPING: A) During the year, two watershed planning groups met to discuss alternatives to help with addressing water quality issues in Curry's Fork and Darby Creek. Both initiatives have environmental and watershed education components that address contamination thru dumping and runoff. B) Our Household Hazardous Waste collection provided information on proper disposal rather than dumping chemicals, fertilizers, etc on the ground, down the drain or in waterways. There is also an Alternative Fact Sheet to Hazardous Chemicals posted on Oldham County's website. C) NO DUMPING signage was placed at

ENFORCEMENT: A) The enforcement responsibility for solid waste issues has been transferred to the Code Enforcement Officer in Planning & Development which began in December of 2009. A more proactive approach is being taken rather than only reacting to complaints find 1/3 more issues have been addressed.

SITING: The application for placement of a solid waste management facility must be submitted to the Planning & Development Office and include a development plan. It must include the correct zoning or apply for rezoning. After review, it goes before the Planning Commission for final approval. (See Oldham County Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance attached)

call with questions, as well as information on how to report illegal dumping, how to prepare recyclables for drop-off and what can be accepted at all locations. Updated website details all locations available to the public for recycling and solid waste disposal.

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: A new school education program began in 2010. The ABC "A Bench for Caps" school recycling program is a partnership between school children, Tri-County Recycling Alliance, Kentucky Division of Waste Management and Green Tree Plastics, - a "hands-on", real life experience in acquiring conservation habits for a lifetime of green living. Students collected 250 pounds of metal-free plastic caps from soft drink bottles, detergent bottles, butter tubs, etc to exchange for a 6' playground bench made from Green Tree Plastics. The city and county schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the state. Each school was provided a large, outdoor school recycling container and containers to move the materials inside the school facilities. Schools can safely store plastics, newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, magazines and office paper for recycling. The road department provides free transportation of the materials to their recycling facility. Three drop-off recycling centers were available to all county residents. The Union County Recycling Center provides free recycling for all county residents. The Recycling Center has expanded to nearly twice its original size and now has under roof, drive-through options for county residents. Aluminum cans were collected by the Union County Habitat for Humanity. Free electronics recycling was available to the residents during 2010. Freecycling was available to county residents during 2010 as an online waste exchange for residents. Over 7 tons of glass was recycled during 2010 and was dropped off at the recycling facility where it was crushed and used in the backfill for culverts construction projects. Newly updated brochures outline the recycling drop-off locations as well as solid waste drop off locations and hours of operation. Brochures included phone numbers where residents may call with questions, as well as information on how to report illegal dumping, how to prepare recyclables for drop-off and what can be accepted at each location. Updated website details all locations available to the public for recycling and solid waste disposal.

ENFORCEMENT: Open Burning regulations were publicized in the local newspapers which informed residents of what was allowed to be burned and what wasn't allowed. This included burn bans. The updated burning brochures with enhanced definition of garbage helped to educate residents about not burning plastics especially. Flyers were distributed in a Sturgis Subdivision of the illegality of burning household waste in burn barrels. The city of Sturgis also placed a notice in the utility bills to inform residents of no burning regulations. Brochures were also passed out at churches. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinances and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents who were found to be in violation. RECYCLING/REDUCTION: A new school education program began in 2010. The ABC "A Bench for Caps" school recycling program is a partnership between school children, Tri-County Recycling Alliance, Kentucky Division of Waste Management and Green Tree Plastics, - a "hands-on", real life experience in acquiring conservation habits for a lifetime of green living. Students collected 250 pounds of metal-free plastic caps from soft drink bottles, detergent bottles, butter tubs, etc to exchange for a 6' playground bench made from Green Tree Plastics. The city and county schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the state. Each school was provided a large, outdoor school recycling container, receptacles for can and bottle recycling, as well as recycling containers in each classroom. Webster County Road Department continued its aggressive cardboard recycling project with containers made by road crew employees and inmates. A float was made for the Christmas parade made out of recyclable items received at the compaction centers. The Road Department also collected tires. Free electronics recycling was available to the residents during 2010. Free drop off of household waste and recycling opportunities at the three compaction centers was available to Webster County residents.

ANTI-LITTERING: Solid Waste brochures outline illegal dumping and littering with phone numbers to call with questions. Litter cleanup events in April and October in the city of Providence --- was advertised in the local paper. Webster County jail provided litter cleanup on public property and along roadsides throughout the year.
