

# 2005 STATEWIDE MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT UPDATE

## Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet Division of Waste Management

### Executive Summary

#### BACKGROUND

Kentucky has made great strides in the proper management of its solid waste since the late '60's when the first solid waste legislation was passed. Some milestones:

- *1966 - Counties began formal solid waste planning --* Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) Chapter 109 gave counties the ability to establish "109 boards" to address solid waste issues.
- *1982 - State laws were expanded --* To provide funding to counties and penalties for noncompliance.
- *1991 through 2005- Counties developed five-year plans and submitted annual reports --* Subsequent legislation furthered the development of county responsibility and state oversight. Counties develop five-year solid waste plans providing for cleanup of illegal open dumps and litter, recycling, access for all households to garbage collection and solid waste education programs. The counties submit annual progress reports to the Environmental and Public Protection Agency providing the basis for cabinet recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly.
- *1996 - Cabinet initiated illegal open dump abatement program --* The goal is to eliminate and prevent illegal open dumps across the Commonwealth.
- *1998 - Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance (KRMA) --* The KRMA program and advisory board were established to develop recycling infrastructures for local governments.
- *1998 and 2001 - PRIDE Programs established --* Federal funds for local illegal open dump cleanup and solid waste education began to flow into eastern and central Kentucky counties through the establishment of the Eastern Kentucky and Bluegrass PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment) programs.
- *2001 - Kentucky Certified Clean County Program is created --* The creation of the Kentucky Certified Clean County Program (KCCCP) in 2001 provided \$4 million for cleanups of illegal open dumps for counties with mandatory garbage collection.
- *2002 - House Bill 174 provides ongoing funding --* The 2002 Kentucky legislature established a statewide, ongoing funding mechanism for the cleanup of illegal open dumps, litter and abandoned landfills. An environmental remediation fee of \$1.75/ton on waste disposed and an annual road fund allotment of \$5 million generate approximately \$15 million annually for these cleanup programs.
- *2006 - Senate Bill 50 amends the Kentucky Pride program --* The amendment creates the authority for the cabinet to provide grants for the development and expansion of recycling programs and household hazardous waste management.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS

- *Illegal open dumping declines -* Illegal open dumping has declined over 85% in the last twelve years. Over 22,900 illegal open dumps have been cleaned since 1993 at a cost of over \$57 million

dollars. There were 597 fewer dumps identified in 2005 than in 2003 – a 49% decline in two years.

- *Litter abatement activities increase* - The KY Pride fund, Eastern KY PRIDE, Bluegrass PRIDE, Department of Transportation, Adopt-A-Highway and cities and counties contributed to the cleanup of 14,635,960 pounds of litter at a cost of \$9 million during 2005. The average cost per pound of litter picked up is \$0.62.
- *Recycling* – Kentuckians recycled 24% of common household recyclables (aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newspaper, glass and paper), an increase of 2% percentage points over 2004. Kentuckians recycled 29% of all municipal solid waste in 2005, which included sludge, concrete, compost, and asphalt in addition to the common household recyclables. We are recycling more but we are also creating more waste. Kentucky waste disposed in landfills increased by 234,308 tons in 2005.
- *Curbside collection increases* - Participation in curbside garbage collection has increased since 1993. HB 174 requires waste haulers and recycling haulers to register and report to each county, providing a more accurate report for curbside collection. The 2005 statewide household participation rate for all collection types is 87.73%.
- *Waste Tire Program* – The Waste Tire Trust Fund was reauthorized in the 2006 General Assembly and will be in effect until July 31, 2010. Over 1.6 million waste tires were recovered in 2005 and recycled at a cost of \$1,879,626 or \$1.17 per passenger tire equivalent (PTE). The recycled tires are used for tire-derived fuel and crumb rubber for athletic fields and schools and community parks.
- *Kentucky's crowning achievement in cleanup* - Keep America Beautiful recognized Kentucky in 2005 as the No. 1 state for waste tire cleanup and recycling during the Great American Cleanup. Kentucky contributed 1.1 million tires of the 2.2 million waste tires cleaned up and recycled nationwide during the March through May campaign.
- *Crumb Rubber Grant* - The Waste Tire Trust Fund awarded forty-seven grants totaling \$1,503,761 to assist schools and communities in projects using crumb rubber from waste tires for athletic fields, gyms, parks and community playgrounds.
- *The cabinet continues to make recycling a priority for the state:*
  - E-scrap workshops funded by an EPA grant began in October and November, 2005. The workshops addressed reuse, recycling and regulatory issues pertaining to e-scrap.
  - Developed an “E-scrap Manual” as a guide to successfully hold collection events and how to properly deal with e-scrap and its hazards.
  - Three dumpster dives were held at public high schools across the state as part of the cabinet’s Earth Day initiatives. This initiative was conceived to increase awareness of recycling in Kentucky’s schools.
  - A glass pulverizer was purchased by the division to loan to county recycling programs to promote different uses for glass other than landfilling or the expensive option of sending it to a glass recycler.
  - Continued the promotion and expansion of recycling by state government offices in 2005.

- The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG) was formed in November, 2005. KRIG is composed of representatives from recycling businesses, industries, counties, cities, non-profit and environmental groups to assist the cabinet on strategies to improve recycling in Kentucky.
- Recycling initiative with state parks continued.
- *The Division of Waste Management's state government office paper recycling program thrives –* Currently serving over 115 building locations in Frankfort and collecting office paper, computer paper, newsprint and cardboard. The shredding of confidential documents provides a zero cost alternative to state and local governments with increasing volume each year. Over 2,385,720 pounds were recycled, a decrease of 24.82% over 2004. The decrease was in large part due to program slow-down for building safety concerns and designing a new building for the office paper recycling program.

## CONCLUSIONS

Kentucky households recycle approximately 24% of their household solid waste, compared to the national average of 30%.

A major component in recycling trends is the commodity markets. As with most commodity market trends, there was a decline during the same time frame, and as markets have picked up, recycling is becoming more profitable. Kentucky lacks adequate infrastructure to capitalize on these improved trends.

With the reallocation of existing funds in the Kentucky Pride Fund, it is now possible to make recycling infrastructure goals attainable. By working with our manufacturers of recycled content products, Kentuckians can recycle and divert these valuable materials away from the landfills to manufacturers for feedstock.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Initiate recycling grants to leverage limited funds into efficient and cost effective projects that will help Kentuckians develop an integrated recycling infrastructure and recycling public education program. Promote market development to add end users to Kentucky and increase economic development opportunities.

Provide Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection programs through the Kentucky Pride Fund to increase the awareness of more responsible recycling and disposal options for items such as mercury thermometers and thermostats, paints and other household hazardous wastes in our homes.

Continue efforts through education and enforcement to prevent illegal open dumping and littering and to provide funding to reduce the number of illegal open dumps and the effects of littering.

**COLLECTION:** The county ran notices in the newspaper letting citizens know that garbage service is mandatory in Breathitt County and that citations would be issued to those citizens not signed up on the garbage service. The Solid Waste Coordinator and Judge Warrix also made several announcements on the radio station reinforcing the newspaper notices. The SWC also writes a regular newspaper column detailing all solid waste issues in Breathitt County.

**DISPOSAL:** The SWC has written several newspaper articles and had several spots on the local radio station telling citizens that they must subscribe to mandatory garbage service and that any bulky items not picked up by the garbage truck must be brought to the transfer station for legal disposal.

**RECYCLING/REDUCTION:** Saving Appalachian Resources present programs concerning solid waste issues to the local schools. SAR's teaches reuse, recycling and reduction to grade school students. A "dumpster dive" was held in March at LBJ Elementary School. This event was extensively covered by the media.

**ANTI-LITTERING:** The SWC puts a spot on the radio monthly detailing the latest anti-littering efforts. The litter crew is instructed to line the road with bags of litt and not pick them up until the end of the day, so that the public can see how much litter is collected. The SWC also includes this information in newspaper articles. A full page color advertisement was taken out in all three of the local newspapers showing before and after photos of roads that the litter crew has picked up. Anti-littering has been the top solid waste campaign for 2005.

**ANTI-DUMPING:** The Solid Waste Coordinator has included illegal dumping as the topic in several newspaper articles. Several "No-dumping-may be monitored by camera" signs are placed where dumps have been previously cleaned. Two people pleaded guilty to illegal dumping in Breathitt Co. and their arrests were detailed on the front page of the largest circulating newspaper.

**ENFORCEMENT:** Several notices have been placed in the local newspapers stating that citations would be issued to citizens not in compliance with our county ordinance. Also, the arrest of two individuals caught illegally dumping was published on the front page of the largest circulating newspaper in the county.

Department has a comprehensive brochure that explains curbside, drop-off and subscription recycling services available to businesses and residents and the identical information is posted on the Departments web site.

Conducted a telephone book recycling campaign in spring and fall to coincide with distribution of White Pages and Yellow Pages directories.

Participated in the US Conference of Mayors "Cans for Cash" program and won an award for most innovative promotional campaign.

Started recycling at four Kentucky Derby Festival events as well as collected recyclables from the cleanup at Churchill Downs after the Kentucky Derby.

Held a mercury collection program in conjunction with the Ky. Div. Of Waste Management and Ky. Dept. of Health Services.

Held a collection for safe collection and disposal of outdated prescription drugs in conjunction with the Louisville Metro Police, Services to the Elderly Program.

Began a cardboard recycling program for all downtown Metro Government buildings with a central collection site for Facilities Services usage.

In conjunction with the Metro Air Pollution control District, the Department operates drop-off locations for old lawnmowers. The Air District provides a rebate for purchase of a new electric mower. The old mowers are recycled.

The Department sponsored a free residential document shredding drop-off in conjunction with the Shred-It company. The shredded documents were recycled.

The Department sponsored a promotion for America Recycles Day at the five attended drop-off recycling centers. A travel mug was offered as an inducement to bring new participants to the drop-off recycling program.

**ANTI-LITTERING:** Brightside coordinated 42 "Litter Free" events, and 251 Neighborhood/Group cleanup activities.

Brightside sponsored anti-litter public service announcements and paid for spots discussing litter reduction on cable, broadcast TV and Radio.

The Department, in conjunction with Brightside, initiated a program where supervisory personnel will report litterers. In conjunction with the Jefferson County Clerk's Office, the litterer is sent a letter detailing the incident and the penalties if that act had been observed by a police officer.

**ANTI-DUMPING:** The Department operates a surveillance camera program for both dumping and littering enforcement. The cameras are designed to catch litterers and dumpers and aid in prosecution and prevention.

**ENFORCEMENT:** Enforcement officers distribute brochures detailing disposal, collection and recycling rules and regulations as well as service options.

•  BMP demonstrations in outdoor laboratory: District's complex features six on-site BMPs: a vegetated roof, an above-ground cistern to capture roof runoff for reuse, porous pavements, an oil/water separator, a biofiltration ditch and a wetland forebay.

•  Outdoor laboratory for BMP performance monitoring

•  Outdoor classroom: Public Service Park serves as an outdoor, interactive, environmental learning center and a proving ground for the six installed BMPs. The park invites engineers, developers, students, and the general public to learn about wetlands, watersheds, aquatic life, proper storm water management, and to discover how to help reduce the amount of pollution entering streams and rivers through storm water runoff. Visitors can take self-guided tours through the park and students can participate in structured field trips which are aligned with the Kentucky Core Content Standards, by following the Journey of a Drop of Water. This journey leads students from a vegetated rooftop, across porous pavement, through a wetland, and ultimately to Banklick Creek, where they can see the effects of their everyday actions on water quality. In 2005, 32 schools (1,784 students, mainly fourth graders) visited Public Service Park for a four-hour interactive tour that lead them through the District's Journey of a Drop of Water. The field trip programming and the accompanying Field Notebook received the 2005 National Environmental Achievement Award in Public Information and Education from the National Association for Clean Water Agencies (NACWA). In May 2005, the District accepted the award at NACWA's 35th Anniversary Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C. The District concentrated on increasing its adult education by giving tours to over 50 organizations, which equated to 2,541 adults. In addition, the District decided to require schools to commit 10 trained chaperones for every 100 students that attended a Public Service Park field trip. The training sessions were 60-90 minutes in length and information was presented on storm water BMPs. A teacher-edition of the student field notebook was created to guide the chaperones on the day of the field trip. The District trained over 300 adults during 2005.

Environmental Art in Education Campaign  
As an innovative way to incorporate art into their educational outreach efforts, the District unveiled three limestone relief carvings sculpted by local artists Karen Heyl and Allan Nairn. The District kicked-off their "Environmental Art in Education" campaign in February 2005 to raise funding for the three art features.

Environmental Day Camp

This summer, the District partnered with the Girl Scout Council of the Licking Valley, Inc., Covington Recreation Center and the Frank Duvenck Arts and Cultural Center and hosted a series of day camps. Funded through a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council, the District used the 1,500 environmental day camp participants as a pilot group to test environmental art lessons that were written in conjunction with the Kenton County Board of Education Elementary Curricular Department.

Environmental Day Camp

This summer, the District partnered with the Girl Scout Council of the Licking Valley, Inc., Covington Recreation Center and the Frank Duvenck Arts and Cultural Center and hosted a series of day camps. Funded through a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council, the District used the 1,500 environmental day camp participants as a pilot group to test environmental art lessons that were written in conjunction with the Kenton County Board of Education Elementary Curricular Department.

This insert highlighted an editorial that featured the District's regional approach to storm water management. The back of the insert featured additional information on the District's Regional Storm Water Management Program.

•  An additional bill insert entitled, "This winter help keep our environment free of hazardous waste!" was sent to all customers. The insert presented information on proper elimination of antifreeze, tires, auto batteries and motor oil.

Newsletter: News Drops, now titled, Water Renewal

News Drops, now titled, Water Renewal is a newsletter that highlights District projects and programs. The newsletter is distributed to city and regional leaders and provides an effective venue for publishing articles related to the District's Regional Storm Water Management Program. The latest issue was distributed in December 2005.

Radio/TV

**What's Happening**

The District publishes a storm water related article in each issue of What's Happening, a region-wide community magazine distributed to each home in Boone County (three times per year), Campbell County (twice per year), and Kenton County (one time per year).

"Power of the People" magazine article

The District's multifaceted site and its regional storm water utility were featured in the July/August 2005 issue of Stormwater Magazine. The article told the District's story of how three counties and 32 municipalities united to create a regional storm water program that ultimately won a national EPA award.

**Mother Nature Campaign**

Mother Nature was featured on TANK bus ads from June 2005 to December 2005. The ad is one element of a multifaceted campaign to bring awareness to the harmful effects of litter and its negative impact to our waterways. The campaign features TANK bus ads, posters, anti-litter pledge cards, distribution of refrigerator magnets to customers and a high school art contest. Participating high schools included Dixie HS, Scott HS, Simon Kenton HS and Holmes HS. The District distributed feedback forms to all participating high schools in order to evaluate the success of the program.

**School Outreach**

**Field Trips**

Classroom instruction is put to practical use as students tour the District's outdoor environmental education center, Public Service Park. Students learn first hand about storm water management and water quality issues. In 2005, the District gave tours to over 3,000 students.

**Classroom Presentations and Storm Water Curriculum**

To date, the District has trained more than 400 teachers on the five-hour curriculum, which now reaches 6,000 students annually. Resource materials include an Environmental Unit Guide for teachers; materials kit; a teacher resource handbook; free on-site training; and a Water Log Workbook for students. The District partners with the 400 teachers by offering to kick-start the environmental unit by teaching the first lesson with the EnviroScape, an interactive learning tool that demonstrates, in real time, the effects of water pollution. This year, the District visited 26 schools and presented to 2,069 students. Moreover, the 6,000 students participating in the District's programming are distributing information to members of their families and community by initiating projects that include: litter cleanups, poster campaigns, environmental readers theatre, pollution walks, storm drain marking, etc.

**Protecting the Environment Award Program**

The District awards schools that go above and beyond when teaching the District's storm water curriculum. Schools contact the District when their students are initiating a project that helps protect the environment. The school then receives a visit from Splash McClean, the District's fish mascot. The school is awarded a certificate and is featured on the District's website. At the end of the school year, a panel of judges chooses a winner among the top ten projects. The winner receives an award plaque and a cash prize. Projects have included school-wide cleanups, poster campaigns, storm drain marking projects, etc. This year, 13 projects were submitted. This award program demonstrates the changes in behavior that occur as a result of the District's Environmental Unit.

**Community Outreach**

**Environmental partnerships**

The District's site and its programming have set the stage for a variety of partnerships: with school districts; with community service groups such as Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts; and with local universities interested in research, problem solving, and environmental restoration along the Banklick Creek adjacent the District

**Partnerships with local agencies**

This Regional Storm Water Management Program represents a partnership of over 30 local governmental agencies. Each of these entities has entered into an inter-local agreement with the District to work toward the implementation of this comprehensive program. Please see Appendix Q for each co-permittee's storm water management activities.

**Partnerships with local organizations**

The District partnered with the Frank Duveneck Arts and Cultural Center (FDACC) to test a year-long Environmental Art in Education pilot program with twenty students. The program is funded through a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council. Below is a list of the program components:

- o  Public Service Park Field Trip

- o  "Art in the Park" Art Show - Upon completion of the field trip, students created their own pieces of art (sculptures, dance, skits, paintings, etc.). The students' art was showcased and students had the opportunity to stimulate dialogue and to teach the community about the environment using their artwork. All student projects were showcased in an environmental art silent auction. The proceeds of the auction were donated back to the FDACC.

- o  "Make the Connection" through Art (Storm Drain Marking Project) - Students bring awareness on this issue to their community by using artwork they will create on their community's storm drains to teach their community to 'think before they dump.' The City of Covington has granted both partners permission to initiate this program.

- o  Anti-Litter Artwork - Students create artwork with an anti-litter message. Artwork will be used on bumper car magnets. Students will then distribute magnets and posters throughout the community in coordination with Earth Day. With the KY Arts Council approval, the bumper magnets could be sold and the profit would be given to the FDACC. Members from the community will be invited to judge the artwork and one winner will be chosen. The winner's artwork will be showcased at the District and the FDACC.

**Highlighted Partnerships**

- As part of the District's partnership with the local conservation districts, the District participated in a two-week environmental day camp hosted at the Campbe

County Environmental Education Center. The District provided volunteer staff to teach 1,000 students about the harmful effects of contaminated storm water runoff and the benefits of wetlands. The District partnered with the Fort Wright Wal-Mart Super Center to fund part of the District's Environmental Art Projects for 2005.

- The District partnered with the National Watershed Coalition by committing to host a conference in May 2005. Participants toured Public Service Park and learned about various BMPs.
- The District partnered with the Kentucky Division of Water to host a state-wide MS4 workshop. The workshop was held in October 2005. The District provided materials and staff to distribute information on Phase II requirements.
- The District hosted a group from the National Regulators Conference in October 2005. The District provided a tour of its facility and distributed information on the site's BMPs.
- The District partnered with the Kentucky National Guard during National Guard Youth Development Week. The District provided staff for a week in July to teach students the harmful effects of water pollution caused by storm water runoff.
- The District met with Thomas More College to discuss the feasibility of starting an Environmental/Storm Water Academy for the college's new Environmental Science majors. Juniors and seniors participating in this major are required to complete an internship. In 2006, the students will be studying the District's retention basin and wetland areas in order to implement a balanced aquatic ecosystem.
- The District partnered with the University of Cincinnati School of Architecture and students enrolled in the college's Watershed Study Courses to host class sessions at the District's site.
- The District partners with Northern Kentucky University by employing college students for internships. The interns assist the District with Public Service Park field trips, presenting Enviroscape lessons, water quality monitoring, and BMP data collection.

**Promote Youth Involvement**

- The District partnered with Boy Scout groups by giving tours of Public Service Park and promoting the District's Storm Drain Marking Program. The Boy Scouts earned a variety of badges, such as the "Save the Planet" badge.
- The District hosted a Girl Scout Day Camp for six weeks in summer 2005. Sixty scouts each week, for six consecutive weeks, toured Public Service Park as a part of their week-long experience with the Girl Scouts. The scouts earned a variety of badges, such as the "Water Drop" badge.

**Storm Drain Marking Program**

The District has continued to promote and market its Storm Drain Marking Program to students, Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts. This year, the District launched a pilot program with the Kenton County Board of Education. The Board's public works department volunteered to mark every storm drain on each of their county's school properties. An element of the District's partnership with the Frank Duveneck Arts and Cultural Center, features the "Make the Connection through Art" program, a storm drain marking project that will bring awareness to the link between storm drains and our waterways. Students bring awareness on this issue to their community by using artwork they will create on their community's storm drains to teach their community to 'think before they dump.' City of Covington has granted permission to both partners to initiate this program.

**RETHINK Campaign**

The RETHINK Campaign targets the following harmful household hazardous wastes: lead from computers, soap from washing your car, oil, antifreeze, tires, batteries, pesticides and paint. Each event will target one or more of these hazards and bring a call to action to the community.

**Contractor Education Programs**

In partnership with the U.S. EPA, the Kentucky Division of Water, the City of Florence, and the Boone, Campbell and Kenton County Conservation Districts, the District sponsored two Regional Sediment and Erosion Control Expos on March 15, 2005 and November 18, 2005. A total of 160 contractors, homebuilders and engineers learned the latest technologies to prevent silt, sediment and mud from leaving their construction sites. Exhibitors displayed recent innovations. News articles, an event card titled, "Are you tired of mud wrestling?" full page ads, website ads and an article in the Conversation District Newsletter helped promote this successful, educational event.

The District, in conjunction with the Kentucky Division of Water, hosted a Storm Water Partnership Workshop on October 11, 2005. City clerks, city administrators, mayors and public works directors attended.
