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


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2009 STATEWIDE MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT UPDATE

Executive Summary

BACKGROUND

Solid waste issues became a major focus in the late 1960s when the first solid waste legislation was passed. Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) Chapter 109, enacted in 1966, gave counties the ability to establish “109 boards” to address solid waste issues. Subsequent legislation furthered the development of county authority and responsibility for the development of five-year municipal solid waste plans and penalties for non-compliance. The five-year solid waste plans require access to garbage collection for all households, cleanup of illegal open dumps and litter, recycling, and solid waste education. Counties submit annual progress reports to the Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC), providing the basis for cabinet recommendations to the governor and the General Assembly.

The Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance (KRMA) program was established in 1998 to assist local governments in developing recycling infrastructure. The cost of developing and expanding recycling programs has always been an issue for local governments.

In 2002, the Kentucky Legislature enacted House Bill (HB) 174, establishing the Kentucky Pride Fund. A \$1.75 environmental remediation fee is paid on each ton of municipal solid waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Funding from the fee is used to characterize and fund closure of orphan landfills and remediate illegal open dumps. Local governments may apply for grant funding for 75 percent of the cost of cleaning illegal open dumps. HB 174 further established an annual transfer of \$5 million from the Transportation Cabinet for litter abatement activities.

In 2006, the legislature enacted Senate Bill (SB) 50, which amended HB 174 to authorize a portion of the funding generated through the \$1.75 environmental remediation fee to be used for recycling and household hazardous waste grants. The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. The cabinet has seen growth in recycling infrastructure and expects this growth to continue, in large part because of the funding authorized by the General Assembly and the support of local governments.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- *Fewer illegal dumpsites identified* – The number of new dumpsites identified has declined 65 percent since 2003. More than 24,700 illegal open dumps have been cleaned since 1993 at a cost of over \$65.2 million dollars, an average cost of \$2,638 per dumpsite.
- *Litter along public roads decreases* – The Kentucky Pride Fund, Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, Bluegrass PRIDE, Transportation Cabinet, Adopt-A-Highway, and cities and counties contributed to the cleanup of 16,402,560 pounds of litter at a cost of \$7.2 million during 2009. The average cost per pound of litter picked up decreased from 55 cents in 2008 to 44 cents in 2009.
- *Recycling* – Kentuckians recycled 29.7 percent of common household recyclables (aluminum, cardboard, steel, plastic, newspaper, glass, and paper) in 2009. Kentuckians recycled 36.5 percent of all municipal solid waste in 2009, which included sludge, concrete, compost, and asphalt in addition to the common household recyclables.

- *Curbside collection* – Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained steady following legislation in 2002 requiring waste haulers and recycling haulers to register and report to each county in which they provide service. The 2009 statewide household participation rate for all collection types is 86.9 percent.
- *Waste Tire Program* – The Waste Tire Trust Fund was reauthorized in the 2010 Special Session of the General Assembly through HB 2 and was in effect until June 30, 2012. The cabinet will be submitting a report to the General Assembly by January 15, 2012, recommending that the program be reauthorized. Tires recycled under this program are beneficially reused for purposes such as tire-derived fuel and crumb rubber for athletic fields, schools, and community parks. During 2009, Kentucky used funding from this program to recover approximately 1.2 million passenger-tire-equivalents during waste tire “amnesties” across the state.
- *Crumb rubber grants awarded* – In 2009, the Waste Tire Trust Fund awarded 11 grants totaling \$199,457 to assist schools and communities in projects using crumb rubber from waste tires for athletic fields, gyms, parks, and community playgrounds.
- *The cabinet continues to make recycling a priority for the state:*
 - The Kentucky Pride Fund Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Grants Committee reviewed more than 50 recycling and HHW grant applications and awarded over \$2 million. Thirty-eight recycling grants were awarded to cities, counties, and universities in 2009; three of the recycling grants awarded were for regional efforts that included two or more counties. HHW grants were awarded to nine counties, with one event serving three counties.
 - The cabinet is working with the Finance and Administration Cabinet to eliminate outsourcing of governmental waste paper for recycling and promote zero-cost shredding of confidential records. The Government Recycling Section gives presentations to all new EEC employees on the importance and benefits of recycling waste paper.
 - The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG) reorganized in 2007 and joined with the Kentucky Pollution Prevention Center to facilitate a much needed statewide program to further develop the recycling infrastructure of the state. Composed of individuals from state and local governments as well as industry, KRIG met during the 2009 Governor’s Conference on the Environment to discuss business “best practices” and how much material is recycled in Kentucky. Also, the KRIG Steering Committee met during the Southeast Recycling Development Council (“SERDC”) meeting in Lexington to discuss goals and directions for the group to pursue in the near future, such as a state-wide recycling directory and America Recycles Day preparations.
- *The Division of Waste Management’s state government office paper recycling program thrives* – The government office paper recycling program serves more than 115 agencies in Frankfort collecting office paper, computer paper, newsprint, and cardboard. State employees recycled 3,184,274 pounds of waste paper in 2009, approximately 279 pounds per state employee. Confidential document destruction provides a zero cost alternative to state and local governments.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Expand training sessions from all cabinet employees to all employees in state government on the benefits of recycling governmental waste paper, which is beneficial to the environment and saves taxpayer dollars.

Expand educational efforts about Kentucky's "all state agency" contract, effective January 1, 2009, with Creative Recycling Systems for the environmentally sound recycling/reuse of the commonwealth's electronic scrap (end of life computer equipment, components & office electronics).

Continue meetings of the Waste Tire Work Group, which was conceived in 2009 and began work in 2010 to improve Kentucky's Waste Tire Program.

Continue and expand efforts to educate citizens and local government officials about the availability of cabinet grants for litter abatement, illegal open dump cleanup, recycling infrastructure, household hazardous waste management, and the purchase of crumb rubber, as well as about the basics of solid waste management and planning.

Municipal Solid Waste Reduction


The cabinet has monitored solid waste disposal since 1993. While HB 174, enacted in 2002, eliminated the 25 percent reduction goal initiated in Senate Bill 2 in 1993, it also established policies to limit and reduce the amount of solid waste disposed through a reduction in the amount of waste generated. The bill also encouraged regional recycling, yard waste composting and resource recovery.

In 2009, Kentucky experienced a 5 percent decrease in Kentucky waste disposal in Kentucky landfills and a 2 percent decrease in the amount of out-of-state waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. Kentucky exported 7 percent of its waste to out-of-state landfills, a increase from 5 percent in 2008. Kentucky landfilled 4,353,018 tons of waste in 2009, a decrease of 169,171 tons from 2008.

Kentucky's recycling rate on common household items (aluminum, cardboard, ferrous and nonferrous metal, plastic, newspaper, glass, and paper) decreased from 34.7 percent in 2008 to 29.7 percent in 2009. The average recycling rate in the Southeast Region in 2006 was 22 percent, while the national average was 28.5 percent. (*The national recycling rate since 2006 had not been released at the time of publication.*) The first recycling grants were awarded in June 2007. As these new recycling programs become more established, Kentucky's recycling rates should increase.

The average cost for waste disposed at Kentucky landfills in 2009 was \$32.44 per ton. Chart No. 1 illustrates the comparison of tonnages of in-state, out-of-state, and the combined total of municipal solid waste received at landfills and the amount in tons of recycled materials in Kentucky, beginning with the base year 2000.

Disposal data from 1994 through 2009 are displayed in Table No. 1.



Municipal Solid Waste Collection Programs

Participation in curbside garbage collection has remained relatively flat since 2003 with an average of 87.5 percent participation. Since 2003, waste haulers and recyclers have been required to register and report annually to the county the number of households utilizing collection service.

Chart No. 2 shows the number of households participating in collection systems from 2003 to 2009.




The average participation rate for collection systems in 2009 was 86.9 percent, which means approximately 13.1 percent of households (232,434 households) are disposing of their garbage illegally or are not accounted for by current tracking methods. Self-haul to a transfer station or convenience center is a legal method of disposal. However, most counties have difficulty tracking customers to this type of facility. Increased reporting requirements from transfer stations and convenience centers is needed to ensure adequate tracking for households participating in proper disposal of municipal solid waste. Multiunit housing is often overlooked

Cleanup of Illegal Open Dumps

Since 1993, more than 24,700 illegal open dumpsites have been cleaned at a cost of \$65.2 million. Chart No. 3 shows the number of dumpsites cleaned since 2003. In 2009, counties cleaned 291 illegal open dumps at a cost of \$2.4 million. The average cost to clean each dumpsite was \$8,271. There were 344 known dumpsites remaining at the end of 2009.

Chart No. 3 shows a decrease in the number of illegal dumps identified since 2004.


Financial assistance, through the Kentucky Pride Fund Illegal Open Dump Grant program, has provided counties the incentive and the necessary financial help to identify and rid their communities of their old dumpsites.



Since 2002, the Kentucky Pride Fund (\$1.75 environmental remediation fee) Illegal Open Dump Reimbursement and/or Grant programs have funded the cleanup of 1,292 dumpsites at a cost of more than \$7 million. The fifth round of illegal open dump grants was awarded in January 2009 for the remediation of 253 dumpsites at a cost of \$2.9 million.

Litter Abatement

In 2001, the division began tracking the cost of litter activities and the number of bags of litter collected. State litter abatement grant funding (Kentucky Pride Fund) began in fiscal year 2002. The cabinet receives \$5 million annually from the Transportation Cabinet for distribution to counties and incorporated cities for litter abatement activities. The success of litter abatement campaigns across the commonwealth is evident in the reduction of litter being picked up along roadways. In 2009, counties cleaned 820,128 bags of litter on 425,898 miles of roadways.



Litter collection costs totaled \$7,197,758, an average cost of 44 cents per pound (\$880 per ton). Most of the items found on roadways

are plastic bottles and food containers. Litter is costly at \$880 per ton when compared to the average landfill disposal rate of \$32.44 per ton. Chart No. 4 reflects the number of bags of litter collected and the amount spent on litter for calendar years 2001-2009.

The Great American Cleanup

The Great American Cleanup, sponsored by Keep America Beautiful, runs March through May annually. The three-month period includes the cleanups sponsored by Commonwealth Cleanup Week (proclaimed the last week of March by the 1998 legislature), Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, and Bluegrass PRIDE.

Kentuckians celebrated the 11th anniversary of Commonwealth Cleanup Week during the week of March 22-28, 2009. Commonwealth Cleanup Week is the combined efforts of city and county governments, individuals, businesses, nonprofit groups, and various state agencies promoting Kentucky’s unique and scenic beauty. The success of Commonwealth Cleanup Week is seen in the level of participation and the amount of waste collected: more than 8,000 volunteers and county and state employees cleaned over 1,000 miles of road and 30 illegal dumpsites while collecting *less* waste than in 2007. Much of this success is attributable to education by the counties of our citizens about waste issues, and the results are showing along our cleaner roadways and countryside. The Great American Cleanup results are listed below for calendar years 2003 - 2009.

Enforcement

In 1997, the cabinet began an emphasis on enforcement of illegal open dumping. Enforcement and education alerts citizens to the importance of proper management of solid waste. These efforts result in the creation of fewer illegal open dumps. In 2009, state inspectors investigated 331 open dump complaints resulting in the issuance of 108 NOVs. Local governments issued fewer citations related to solid waste management, but the number of warning letters increased by 18.2 percent.




Chart No. 5 (page 7) shows the number of county-issued citations, warning letters, and subsequent court actions for the calendar years 2003 – 2009.

Education

Virtually all counties provide some level of solid waste education. Counties conduct local activities through schools, radio, newspapers, television, brochures, fairs, contests, etc. Civic groups, extension service, homemakers clubs, school groups, Department for Environmental Protection staff, and local nonprofit organizations all provide support through local involvement in solid waste education activities.

The cabinet hosts solid waste training and education workshops annually for county solid waste coordinators, area development district staff, environmentalists, elected officials, and interested citizens. State staff also provides assistance and ensures compliance through annual site visits to all counties, monthly newsletters, daily phone calls, and correspondence.

County Recycling and Recycling Education Programs

Beginning March 1, 2004, HB 174 required recyclers to report annually to the county the amount of municipal solid waste collected for recycling by volume, weight or number of items, and the type of items recycled. Statewide recycling rates of common household items such as glass, paper, metal, and plastics decreased from 34.7% to 29.7% in 2009. Chart No. 6 maps the recycling rate since 2000. Table 3 shows the breakdown by recycled material. Note that the 404,380 ton decrease in ferrous metals accounts for 72% of the 2008 - 2009 tonnage change. The drop in waste landfilled and recycled is attributable to a reduction in manufacturing, construction, and overall spending. During the economic downturn, many end-users of scrap either curtailed production or shut down, thereby reducing the demand and lowering the price for scrap. This resulted either in scrap being stockpiled awaiting price increases or scrap not being picked up for recycling.





Other factors that contributed to the decreased recycling rate include:

- Recycling prices dropped dramatically in December, 2008 and continued to decrease through June, 2009.
- Steel, aluminum, and paper mills took “down time” because of lack of orders, as did plastics manufacturers that use recycled plastic for feedstock.
- The amount of electronic scrap (“e-scrap”) decreased as residents and businesses did not upgrade their equipment, but kept their current computers.
- The amount of office paper (mixed and white) decreased because of layoffs, business cutbacks, and closings.
- The amount of glass, newspaper, mixed residential paper, plastics, and steel cans increased as people stayed home more and ate fewer meals in restaurants because of the economy.

State Government Paper Recycling Program

The Division of Waste Management, Government Recycling Section, continues to operate the state paper



recycling program serving more than 115 agencies in Frankfort. The Government Recycling program has been self-supporting, funding seven full-time staff positions. The Government Recycling Section offers free pickup and free document destruction of governmental office paper. The Government Recycling Section moved to its new location on Northgate Drive in June 2006. The new facility offers a secured environment to address confidentiality issues. Office paper represents 80 percent of the waste stream in the office environment. The cabinet has been tracking the amount of governmental waste paper recycled since 1993, with more than 34.5 million pounds of paper being recycled through this program. Since 2002, state employees recycled more than 18.5 million pounds of waste paper, generating more than \$1,583,723.75 in revenue. In 2009, government offices recycled 3,184,274 pounds (1,592 tons) of paper, newsprint, and cardboard – approximately 279 pounds per state employee. Chart No. 7 reflects the pounds of governmental waste paper recycled for calendar years 2002–2009.

Kentucky Recycling and Marketing Assistance Program (KRMA)

The Division of Waste Management’s 2009 Kentucky Pride Fund Recycling and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Grants Committee reviewed more than 50 recycling and HHW grant applications and awarded over \$2 million. Thirty-eight recycling grants were awarded to cities, counties, and universities in 2009; three of the recycling grants awarded were for regional efforts that included two or more counties. HHW grants were awarded to nine counties, with one event serving three counties. Materials collected included E-scrap, pesticides, solvents, mercury and other HHW products found around the home. Mercury collection events were held by 8 counties, with one event serving 3 counties. These events were made possible by the Kentucky Pride Fund. The grants require a 25 percent local match in the form of cash or “in-kind” personnel, educational activities/materials and advertising to promote the program from the cities or counties receiving the awards. The grants are funded through the \$1.75 Environmental Remediation Fee paid on each ton of waste disposed in Kentucky landfills. The program’s goal is to encourage recycling and HHW management events in areas where few of these opportunities for citizens exist, with an emphasis on regional cooperative efforts.

The Kentucky Recycling Interest Group (KRIG) reorganized in 2007 and joined with the Kentucky Pollution Prevention Center to facilitate a much-needed statewide program to further develop the recycling infrastructure of the state. Composed of individuals from state and local governments as well as industry, KRIG met during the 2009 Governor’s Conference on the Environment to discuss business “best practices” and how much material is recycled in Kentucky. Also, the KRIG Steering Committee met during the SERDC meeting held in Lexington to discuss goals and directions for the group to pursue in the near future, such as a state-wide recycling directory and America Recycles Day preparations. The annual KRIG spring meeting took place in Frankfort.

E-scrap collection is growing in the state, with approximately 48 counties offering some type of e-scrap collection. Year-round e-scrap drop-off programs are increasing across the state with 19 counties now offering them. Another 21 counties offer some type of e-scrap collection, whether periodic or an annual event. More than 2,341 tons of e-scrap was collected in 2009. Beginning in 2008, the Kentucky Pride Fund program provided grant awards for the management of HHW, a category that includes e-scrap and mercury. Also in 2008, the Finance and Administration Cabinet awarded an e-scrap recycling contract to a national vendor, Creative Recycling Services (www.crsercycling.com), which became effective January 1, 2009. This “all-agency” contract allows the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government, school districts, universities, and any other public (not-for-profit) convenient access to recycling. The contract provides for statewide pickup and recycling services; with effectively zero percent (0%) of the scrap going to commonwealth landfills. This contract is unique in that the vendor pays the agencies/school districts/universities/local governments for selected items aggregated for recycling. Since the contract took effect, over 1,500 tons of e-scrap have been collected from 482

agencies/locations and refurbished or recycled in an environmentally sound and data secure manner year to date (January 2009 to January 2010). Payments to generators have netted over \$58,000.

The Glass Pulverizer Loan Program has taken a new direction since the demise of the loaner machine that produced over 110 tons of pulverized glass aggregate (PGA) across the Commonwealth in a 4 year span. Now, several counties have taken advantage of the Recycling Grants program and have purchased higher capacity pulverizers (capable of pulverizing up to 3,000 pounds of glass per hour). The following entities are actively setting up pulverizing and PGA use programs: Regional Recycling Program (Washington, Marion and Nelson counties), The Murray State University, City of Murray and Calloway County Recycling Consortium, and the Pennyriple Recycling Corporation (Eddyville). Several other community recycling programs are planning to apply for grants to purchase pulverizers so they can continue to recycle glass containers in an economical and effective manner.

The End of Life Vehicle Solutions – 2009 (ELVS) targets mercury-containing switches removed from automobiles before the autos are salvaged for scrap metal. The 105 participants collected 17.75 pounds of mercury from 8,066 switches.

Waste Tire Trust Fund

The Waste Tire Trust Fund was reauthorized in the 2010 Special Session of the General Assembly through HB 2 and will be in effect until June 30, 2012. The cabinet will be submitting a report to the General Assembly by January 15, 2012, recommending that the program be reauthorized. Funding comes from a \$1 fee on the sale of all new motor vehicles tires sold in Kentucky. The fund is used to conduct waste tire amnesty programs, award crumb rubber grants, and facilitate market development for the use of waste tires.

In 2009, tire amnesties were conducted in 33 counties in the Bluegrass, Pennyriple, Barren River and Lincoln Trail Area Development Districts (ADDs.) A total of 1,196,816 waste tires (“passenger-tire-equivalents,” or PTEs) were recovered through these amnesties at a cost to the fund of \$1,182,945. This represents less than a one percent decrease in PTEs recovered for these same ADDs compared with the last amnesties, conducted in 2004-2005.

Crumb Rubber Grants

From 2004 – 2009, the cabinet awarded 215 grants totaling more than \$5.8 million to local government, schools, daycares, churches and other entities for the use of crumb rubber made from recycled tires on athletic fields, playgrounds, walking trails, landscaping, gymnasium floors, etc. In 2009, the cabinet awarded eleven grants totaling \$199,457 for crumb rubber projects to be completed during the year. Funding for the crumb rubber grants comes from the Waste Tire Trust Fund.

County Summary for 2009

Educational Activity:

COLLECTION: The Solid Waste Coordinator (SWC) writes regular news articles for the various newspapers in the area. He also has regular radio announcements stating that collection is mandatory, along with how to sign up.
DISPOSAL: The SWC utilizes the local newspapers and radio to do announcements about special cleanup events and to also tell citizens that the transfer station is available for legal disposal.
RECYCLING/REDUCTION: The SWC works closely with the Breathitt Co. Action Team to promote recycling with several mtgs. per year. One member has started a Facebook page discussing recycling issues & what's available in the county. The SWC advertises the Co. E-Scrap program on the radio & in the newspaper several times a year. Three of the elementary schools have recycling trailers & the SWC takes the trailers to Perry Co. to be emptied several times a year.
ANTI-LITTERING: The SWC frequently writes about littering in his newspaper articles. He also mentions littering problems several times a year on the radio. Also twice a year the SWC participates in a 30 minute talk show on the local radio station called "To the Point" where he tells the public what is going on with the various solid waste issues in Breathitt County.
ANTI-DUMPING: The SWC frequently writes about dumping in the newspaper. He also talks about illegal dumping several times a year on the radio. When searching for names in a dump, the SWC waits until a car drives past, then holds a piece of paper up so that the passing car can see him looking for names. Sometimes the paper doesn't have a name, but passing cars don't know that. Yes, Breathitt County has a sneaky coordinator.
ENFORCEMENT: The SWC makes regular visits to households not signed up on the garbage service. He issues a written Notice of Violation to these households if they fail to respond to the NOV, he files a criminal complaint. Enforcement is frequently mentioned in newspaper articles and radio announcements.

Educational Activity:

COLLECTION: Waste Management personnel similarly hosted a recurring government television show, "A Green Bluegrass," addressing collection, recycling, disposal, littering, illegal dumping, composting, enforcement, and special cleanup activities. Waste Management staff also participated in other public access and local network news reports to highlight Waste Management activities. Additionally, the Division of Waste Management ran a commercial campaign addressing proper setout procedures for collection. The Division of Waste Management further hosted booths at the Home & Garden Show, FoxFest, Energy Expo, Big Blue Goes Green, and Green Living Expo. Employees again distributed information concerning proper collection procedures, yard waste collection, home composting enforcement issues, disposal options, and the Rosie recycling program. The Office of Public Information also notified citizens of holiday collection schedules and special collection events through several press releases. The Department of Environmental Quality correspondingly published and distributed solid waste guides in English and Spanish addressing recycling, yard waste, garbage collection, call-in collection, and other disposal/recycling options. Moreover, the Division of Waste Management personnel maintain a comprehensive website that provides information on all Waste Management services:

Newsletters

The Division of Waste Management circulated three residential, two school, two business, and one apartment newsletter with information on proper procedures for waste, yard waste, and recyclables. The newsletters also included information regarding collection, disposal options, anti-litter and anti-dumping campaigns enforcement issues, and special cleanup activities.

DISPOSAL: Waste Management personnel similarly hosted a recurring government television show, "A Green Bluegrass," addressing collection, recycling, disposal, littering, illegal dumping, composting, enforcement, and special cleanup activities.

RECYCLING / REDUCTION:

Recycling in Businesses:

Bluegrass PRIDE worked with 235 businesses (up from 157 businesses) in their WasteBuster program. Their work included 17 presentations to staff members, to a total of 403 people; 1 tour of the recycling center for staff members of a business; distribution of fliers, decals, stickers and mini Rosies; 6 Waste Audits conducted; and, media efforts with 5 articles published on recycling.

The WasteBuster program worked with businesses in addressing their specific concerns and barriers found. The program offered the following:

- a. Personal visit
- b. Waste audit
- c. Promotional and signs materials
- d. Presentation for employees/training materials
- e. Guidance on things to do to increase participation
- f. Information on where to get indoor recycling bins
- g. Solve problems related to Rosies delivery and service
- h. Cost savings information and guidance
- i. Commitment card for participation for at least a year
- j. Flier on waste reduction

The WasteBuster program began working with property management companies, such as Webb Companies, APEX Realty, Parkway Developers, and NAIssac property management. Businesses that excelled in the WasteBuster program were recognized in the Lexington Herald- Leader for their efforts. The WasteBuster program worked with a committee on the planning of recycling efforts at the World Equestrian Games, including 2 presentations, to a total of 85 people. The WasteBuster program worked on planning recycling events, such as an Arbor Day celebration, Do the Green at Lexington Green, and 2nd Sunday.

Recycling in Apartments:

Bluegrass PRIDE worked with 85 apartment complexes (up from 50) in the WasteBuster program. However, because 10 of these apartments have discontinued or not yet started their recycling program, the total number of active WasteBuster apartments is 75, which represent a total of 11,407 units in Fayette County.

Promotional efforts of the program include distribution of fliers, newsletters and magnets to all apartments and a newly designed keychain with recycling information to be included in move-in packets.

The WasteBuster program did presentations at 2 apartment complex for its residents and 6 presentations to general community members (210 people) on recycling.

A total of 4 UK sororities/fraternities became WasteBusters, and have agreed to allow community members to bring their recyclables to their Rosies.

WasteBusters targeted all apartment complexes that already had a recycling roll off and all 3 of them became WasteBusters. The WasteBuster program worked with Japanese American Society of Kentucky to translate the recycling flier into Japanese.

PRIDE identified remaining barriers and ongoing issues:

- a. Trash in Rosies at some apartments
- b. Rosies not being emptied regularly
- c. Correct signage
- d. Need for more recycling bins

e. Language barriers

WasteBusters continued to update the database of local apartment complexes, especially those that are interested in offering or expanding a recycling program. A variety of press releases were issued on special collection programs, pickup schedules and illegal dump cleanups.

A series of radio and TV commercials were produced and aired on local stations.

In 2009, a Back-to-School Rally was also held, which provided backpacks to 6,000 elementary school students and 2,000 middle and high school students across Fayette County. These backpacks contained more than \$72,000 in school supplies and also fliers including recycling information. Please see Appendix A for additional information.

ANTI-LITTERING: Litter is a problem that costs Lexington thousands of dollars each year through cleanup costs and lost economic development and tourism. The LitterBuster campaign is aimed at cleaning up and preventing litter through action, outreach and enforcement. Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government is now a Keep America Beautiful affiliate. The Department of Environmental Quality was responsible for an annual litter assessment of 20% of county roads. The department provides assistance in anti-litter education and promotion of responsible stewardship. The Department of Environmental Quality staff spoke on several radio and TV programs about special cleanup events such as Kentucky River Clean Sweep and Great American Cleanup. Bluegrass PRIDE continued the LitterBuster campaign and relationships with local groups related to litter in Fayette County, such as: Downtown Lexington Corporation, LFUCG Environmental Commission, and The Corridors Committee. During 2009, Bluegrass PRIDE received over 400 litter reports from Fayette County citizens. This data was sent on a regular basis to LFUCG GIS department to be used in the identification of the litter hot spots in Fayette County. The anti-litter campaign received various media attention including, 3 print articles, 1 website article, and 3 radio shows. Bluegrass PRIDE also played a major roll in three litter clean up events in Fayette County. Participation included recruiting of volunteers and providing bags and gloves. A total of 60 volunteers were involved at the following locations, West Hickman neighborhood, Park Hills neighborhood, and the vb2nd Sunday event downtown. Bluegrass PRIDE assisted in planning four litter free events, including two different NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness) walks, Do the Green at Lexington Green, and Arbor Day celebration.

ANTI-DUMPING: A variety of press releases were issued on special collection programs, pickup schedules and illegal dump cleanups.

ENFORCEMENT: Enforcement commercial aired on various media outlets outlining proper disposal methods. The LFUCG Division of Solid Waste sent out three residential newsletters and one school newsletter with information on proper disposal options, enforcement issues, and special cleanup activities.

SITING: The LFUCG Division of Solid Waste maintains a comprehensive website that provides information siting requirements for solid waste facilities.

An additional service for our seniors was pickup and removal at no cost.

Anti-Littering: Clean up week sponsored by the Commonwealth of KY is our biggest effort by the community. We incorporated the county wide clean up to coincide with State efforts, which seem to be served to all residents. The three cities in our county also participate with curb style service. To promote the 3R's along with providing a county pride, will do much to promote litter control. The county has also offered incentives to promote litter cleanup.

Anti-Dumping: Post warning signs throughout the communities in areas of high collection of illegally dumped trash, appliances and tires. Use cameras to provide necessary information needed to prosecute these individuals. Place emphasis on DO NOT LITTER programs, involving our children to promote the message to their parents, grandparents and siblings. Provide adequate warnings of the fine associated with littering. When arrested and prosecuted and found guilty, you could find up to \$500.

Enforcement: Encourage law enforcement community to take littering seriously. When violations are reported or discovered, we must do our job. Speak directly to the youth and explain the seriousness of these offenses.

Management brochure containing recycling information as well as professional recycling displays were featured at the Solid Waste Management Booth at every public event in the county. These events included the Earth Day Festival, Rural Heritage Festival, Paint Lick Village Days, and the annual Beautify Garrard County "Party on the Square" event.

Recycling was also promoted in all three county elementary schools and featured a fun, child-oriented presentation encouraging recycling. Recycling/Reduction presentations were also given to numerous civic groups in 2009, including the local chapter of the AARP and several church groups.

Several newspaper articles, public service announcements, and letters to the editor were featured in the two newspapers covering Garrard County throughout the year.

Anti-Litter: Anti-litter education was accomplished in conjunction with recycling education and was promoted through literature and displays at public events in the county. Anti-litter education was also incorporated into presentations given at the elementary schools and civic groups throughout the year.

Garrard County Solid Waste once again sponsored the annual "Beautification Anti/Litter Campaign" that ran from May 1st through middle of June. Garrard County Judge/Executive John Wilson issued an executive order proclaiming May as "Beautification Month" in the county. Through a series of news stories, flyers, various social media, and radio, citizens were encouraged to clean up litter or help a neighbor tidy up their property in an effort to beautify the community. Any individual who engaged in a clean-up activity during the campaign was eligible to enter a drawing for donated prizes at the annual Beautify Garrard County "Party on the Square". The annual event, which is the official ending of the campaign for the year, is anti-litter themed and drew more than 1,000 people to the town square for a night of free music, food, games, and fun.

Anti-litter education was also accomplished through several news stories highlighting the prosecution of litter offenders in the county.

Anti-Dumping: Anti-Dumping education was rolled into the anti-litter themed educational activities for the year as Garrard Solid Waste Management sought to curb the overall illegal disposition of trash in the county.

ENFORCEMENT: The county solid waste ordinance clearly defines illegal dumping and sets penalties for violators. Warning letters were sent out and summonses were issued for illegal dumps and junk accumulations.

SITING: Since a siting ordinance was enacted in 2005, public hearings and meetings have received newspaper coverage in Lancaster and Danville.

2009 County Annual Report Summary

COLLECTION: A newly updated website details all locations available to the public in Henderson County for recycling and solid waste disposal such as where residents can dispose of household waste, bulky items such as furniture, appliances and tires. Residents can log on to find out what is accepted for recycling and how to prepare recyclables for drop off. Residents can email questions to the Coordinator for specific recycling or waste disposal needs. Household hazardous waste disposal tips are also included. The city of Henderson curbside recycling continued with an increase in participation rate. Henderson City Curbside Recycling continued with an increase in participation. Recycling brochures inserted into the utility mailing increased interest in the program. Media coverage of the curbside recycling program was extensive this year as residents supported the program. Commercials, which are two minute "infomercials" on what is recyclable and how to prepare materials for recycling, continued to air on cable programming, which saturated approximately 80% of the Henderson City households. The City of Henderson provided a weekly, municipally operated waste collection program and private haulers continued collecting solid waste from city residents as well. County residential waste customers are franchised and are required to provide 30-90 gallon carts with wheels and attached lid. This information was advertised through publications, brochures, radio call-in programs, newspaper articles, phone calls and various media outlets.

DISPOSAL: Rural residents of Henderson County were given free disposal at the Henderson City Transfer as a newly offered waste disposal program. Numerous articles appeared and residents were informed of the free program. Waste tire recycling at the Henderson County Recycling Center was promoted as a disposal option for tires. A newly updated website details all locations available to the public in Henderson County for recycling and solid waste disposal such as where residents can dispose of household waste, bulky items such as furniture, appliances and tires. Residents can log on to find out what is accepted for recycling and how to prepare recyclables for drop off. Residents can email questions to the Coordinator for specific recycling or waste disposal needs. Updated recycling brochures outlined recycling drop-off locations for Henderson City and Henderson County residents as well as solid waste drop off locations and hours of operation. Phone numbers where residents may call with questions were included in the brochures as well as information on how to report illegal dumping, how to prepare recyclables for drop-off and what can be accepted at each location. The brochures also include private companies that accept recyclables from the public and solid waste haulers for county residents. The SWC sent out press releases to the local radio station and newspaper to the Henderson City Curbside Recycling Program, school recycling program and answer questions from the public on a call-in basis. SWC also conducted presentations in the schools to educate students and staff of their recycling and solid waste options in Henderson County. Each school visited received coloring books, brochures and pencils made from recycled denim or paper.

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: Tri-County Recycling Alliance received a recycling grant from the State Division of Waste Management for equipment and to promote recycling education. Henderson County Community College offered green "Kidz Kollege" celebrating environmental education through drama, cooking, music and math -- all centered around the environment. SWC presented educational materials and information to students. Free electronics recycling was available to Henderson residents in 2009 at the Henderson County Recycling Center. Residents from Henderson City and County could participate and could drop off, free of charge all residential electronic items. Educational brochures, denim pencils, litter bags, and variety of recycled content items were distributed to participants and visitors to the Recycling Center. Local radio, newspaper and television outlets promoted the recycling efforts and raised recycling awareness. A new Pilot Tire Recycling Program sponsored by KY DWM began in 2008 and continued until June 30, 2009 and provided residents and businesses of Kentucky free drop off of an unlimited number of tires for recycling at the Recycling Center located at the Henderson County Road Department. Over 3,500 tires were collected and recycling during 2009. Advertising for the program was provided by educational brochures, television news coverage, radio call in and local newspaper. "The Art of Recycling" art contest and exhibit was conducted by the Ohio Valley Art League and on exhibit for several weeks at the Henderson Fine Arts Center. Artists from around the Tri-State area were asked to create either two or three dimensional artwork using recycled materials. Tri-County Recycling Alliance helped promote and sponsor the event. The local newspaper featured a large article about the art show. Christmas Tree recycling for Henderson City residents was provided for the 13th straight year. Residents brought in trees which were 6" in diameter or less to the Newman Park. Trees were chipped and mulch was applied to city trails and around trees. Advertising in local newspaper, radio stations and TV station. Christmas recycling opportunities of boxes, wrap and other items appeared in the local newspaper and are included in the curbside recycling program. Website was newly updated and provided information for recycling opportunities in Henderson County including drop-off recycling center and city of Henderson Curbside Recycling. A grant from the National Recycling Coalition and Coca-Cola continued to benefit the school recycling program in Henderson City and County schools. Large indoor aluminum can and plastic bottle containers will be distributed in each of the schools as part of the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition, the schools are provided a large, outdoor school recycling container donated by the Tri-County Recycling Alliance and the National Association of Plastic Container Recycling and 30 or 90 gallon recycling containers to move the materials inside the school facilities. The city of Henderson continued supporting the Henderson School recycling program which provides free pickup of material with the Henderson Curbside Recycling Program. Henderson County Fiscal Court and Road Department personnel provided free pickup of recycled materials in the rural schools. Two free "Paper Shred Days" were held in conjunction with "America Recycles Day" and in conjunction with Earth Day at the Henderson County Recycling Center. Residents were allowed to bring in 200 lbs of sensitive documents to be shredded by a mobile shredding company. Over 8 tons of paper was shredded and recycled. The Henderson Curbside Recycling Program, Henderson County Recycling Center program, environmental laws and disposal options with information about environmental awareness including KY "NO BURN" laws, educational magnets and pencils were distributed in the schools and at the drop-off center. Mass mailing of 15,000 city of Henderson recycling brochures was accomplished by insertion into utility billings which reached every eligible door-to-door curbside recycling participant. Weekly reminders appeared every Thursday on the front page of the local newspaper to remind residents of which recycling route was being picked up by the city of Henderson Curbside Recycling Program. Habitat for Humanity ran newspaper advertisements promoting changes to their aluminum can recycling program. During 2009, Habitat was no longer the recipient of cans dropped off at the Henderson County Recycling Center but they added two new public drop off locations for can donations. Habitat for Humanity continued to operate their new Habitat Re-Store which supplies new or slightly used cabinets, furniture, paint, lumber, nails, etc... at a very low cost. The Re-Store helps generate income for the charity which builds new homes for poorer Americans. Recycling Coordinator went into each school in the Henderson County School District and distributed recycling containers and educational materials for school students and staff. Presentations were made to classrooms upon request about the "why, what and how to" of recycling. Tours of the recycling center were given by the recycling coordinator to students from several local elementary schools throughout the year and provided hands-on public education of the recycling process. Recycled park equipment located at the Henderson County Park and crumb rubber playground promoted recycling and as used extensively by public and school groups. Advertisements for recycling appeared in the local newspaper throughout the year. Henderson County recycling its crushed glass in new road bed construction projects during

2009. Advertising in the Henderson Progress Edition in April was delivered to over 13,000 households and helped to explain to residents what can be recycled and how to prepare materials for recycling at the Henderson County Recycling Center and in the Henderson City Curbside Recycling programs. The local newspaper donated half of the cost of advertising for ads to run to promote the recycling program. Articles appeared in the newspaper which informed residents of the curbside recycling program. Cell phone and rechargeable battery recycling was added as a permanent recycling option for Henderson City and County residents at the Henderson County Recycling Center. Residents can recycle these items at no cost seven days per week in this new program. Used motor oil, hydraulic fluids, vegetable oils and transmission fluids were collected from the public and utilized by the Henderson County Road Department to heat the garage area. The farm pesticide recycling program was conducted at the Henderson County Garage. Over 800 pesticide containers were recycled and kept from the landfill during the collection events.

ANTI-LITTERING: The City of Henderson conducted a Spring Cleanup in conjunction with Operation Community Pride, which lasted for two weeks where residents could place bulky waste and tree limbs on the curb for free pickup. Trees and limbs were collected by the City of Henderson sanitation crews. No hazardous material was accepted. Radio station and local newspaper promoted the cleanup. Ohio River sweep was advertised for volunteers and conducted cleanup on two miles of shoreline. Recycling steel bins from Tri-County Recycling was painted by students and placed at Newman Park recreational fields and will continue to provide recycling services at the park for many years and continue to increase accessibility for residents to recycle during athletic events. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning, or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers. Henderson County Detention Center Inmate Program provided equipment and personnel to work to cleanup litter and illegal dumps along public right-of-way. The Henderson County Detention Center inmate work release program cleaned all public roadways collecting trash from public properties over the 12 month period. The program was provided year round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas. To date, the community service provided by the Henderson County Detention Center is the best Henderson County has ever had in its history.

ANTI-DUMPING: A website link to the KY DWM details what to do with hazardous waste. Residents can also find information on how to report illegal dumping either locally or anonymously through the state 1-888-NODUMPS hotline. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering, and the punishment for such crimes was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the state and county's illegal dumping, illegal burning or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers. Henderson County Detention Center cleaned illegally dumped waste on public right-of-way and from public properties. This program was provided year-round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas. To date, the community service provided by the Henderson County Detention Center, is the best Henderson County has ever had in its history. The SWC and Code Enforcement Officer helped educate individuals on private property on solid waste ordinances.

ENFORCEMENT: Henderson County Fiscal Court continued to use undercover surveillance cameras in illegal dump enforcement. A trash brochure outlining the county ordinance and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment was made available to residents who were found to be in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning, or littering ordinances. The brochures also included a Henderson County Illegal Dump and Solid Waste Hotline number to report illegal dumping, littering or to get more information about haulers.

Educational Activity:

2009 County Annual Report Summary

COLLECTION: A) In the fifth year of the solid waste franchise agreement which began 2-1-05, a CPI (Cost Price Index) increase was due per the contract. After several meetings, the contractor waived the increase and decreased the cart rental fee per month from \$1 to \$.08. B) Franchise contractor and SWC spoke or met with over 3,000 residents educating them on collection volumes, setout points, bulk items, disposal of items other than household garbage such as CDD material, etc..

DISPOSAL: A) A lesson on "Home Cleaning Products...Safe, Health & Green" was held by the Extension Office. B) We also have information on our website about proper disposal of motor oil, antifreeze, compact fluorescent light bulbs, styrofoam peanuts. C) Residents were reminded that white goods and other metal items could be taken to a metal recovery facility just inside Jefferson County and they would be paid by the MRF to do so. D) Residents were advised whenever inquiries were made that woody waste could be taken to the Natural Products composting facility for reuse.

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: A) A water filtration system was demonstrated for Earth Day to 4th graders. B) The Solid Waste Coordinator also spoke about the benefits of recycling to a group of seniors at the Tri County Community Action Agency as part of Earth Day. C) Yew Dell Gardens, a county tourist attraction used our event recycling stands for their April plant sale and their Derby activities. D) In the May 28 edition of Oldham Era, a column entitled "In the Image of God" wrote about recycling and the opportunities the Oldham County Recycling Center offers to residents. It was written from a religious point of view tying in the beginning of time with preserving our environment for the future. E) The SWC spoke at Ballardsville Baptist Church with approximately 75 residents from the Grande Dell Subdivision about the benefits of recycling, recyclable materials accepted at the Recycling Center and the timeframe in which curbside recycling would be available in their area. F) The Recycling Center increased its capacity for co-mingled collection with an additional 30cy container. The unstaffed center started in July 2007 with one container for both fiber and co-mingled. E) The county also bales mill-ready cardboard and live load semis. In 2009, we recycled 190.47 tons of baled cardboard.

ANTI-LITTERING: Forty-five different non-profit organizations participated in our State funded Anti-Litter Campaign. Groups who chose to segregate recyclables received an additional stipend. Each group is required to write a letter to the editor of our local newspaper about their experiences. I do not believe there is any better way to impact, particularly these young people who are the primary participants, of the negative affects of littering. Because of participating in litter pickup it is hoped they will not be future litterers when they reach driving age or will think twice about doing so because of participating in this program. B) Wildflower seed packets were used as handouts with the message PLANT THE "DO NOT LITTER" SEED! We also had jar openers that were in the shape of a foot that said "STOMP OUT LITTER" (they were made of recycled tires) to bring awareness to the county's campaign and were used at events and presentations as well as handed out at our recycling center. C) Oldham County Police produced an anti-litter PSA in 2008 which advised the public if someone is observed littering they would be ticketed and incur a \$500 fine and possible court costs. This continued to run on our Government Channel 25 in 2009.

ANTI-DUMPING: A) The Extension Homemakers held a seminar "Hazardous Chemicals and our Body" which was facilitated by two UK researchers about toxic waste sites in Oldham County. B) The Oldham Era printed an article on dump site that was cleaned by the Solid Waste Department. C) Our Household Hazardous Waste collection provided information on proper disposal rather than dumping chemicals, fertilizers, etc on the ground, down the drain or in waterways.

ENFORCEMENT: A) The enforcement responsibility for solid waste issues has been transferred to the two Code Enforcement Officers in Planning & Development. A more proactive approach is being taken rather than only reacting to complaints.

"The Art of Recycling" art contest and exhibit was conducted by the Ohio Valley Art League and on exhibit for several weeks at the Henderson Fine Arts Center. Artists from around the Tri-State area were asked to create either two or three dimensional artwork using recycled materials. Tri-County Recycling Alliance helped promote and sponsor the event. A local newspaper featured a large article about the art show. Educational brochures were distributed along with the display which focused public attention on recycling education efforts in the community and in the schools. During 2009, all schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the State of Kentucky. Each school was provided a large outdoor school recycling container donated by Tri-County Recycling Alliance and the National Association of Plastic Container Recycling and 30 gallon recycling containers to move the materials inside the school facilities. Schools now safely store plastics, newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, magazines and office paper for recycling. The Union County Road Department provides free transportation of the materials to the recycling center. Participating with Webster, Henderson, McLean and Union Counties, the Tri-County Recycling Alliance's School Recycling Program serves approximately 13,000 students. Grants continue to promote recycling education by the Tri-County Recycling Alliance for Union County. Funds were used for recycling education and equipment necessary to enhance recycling efforts in the cities and counties of Henderson, Webster, Union and McLean. Three drop off centers are available to all county residents with the primary, permanent location located at the county road department garage in Morganfield with another recycling collection site in Sturgis that opened one day a week for four hours and a site in Uniontown that is also opened one day a week for four hours. Items accepted at these locations are collected by a portable recycling trailer and include: plastics bottles #1 & #2, glass, newspapers, magazines, aluminum cans, office paper/junk mail, cardboard, cereal boxes and tissue boxes. The recycling Center added free tire recycling from January through June, 2009. The recycling expanded to twice its original size and now has under roof, drive through options for county residents. These changes were publicized in the local newspapers. The farm pesticide recycling program netted 1,811 lbs of recycling pesticide containers. The county extension office informed farmers of the free program. Recycling in the Union County Courthouse continued to model environmental responsibility to residents by progressive leadership. Aluminum cans were collected by the Union County Habitat for Humanity drop-off locations. Free electronics recycling was available to county residents twice during the year. Freecycle online waste exchange. Glass was recycled, crushed and used as backfill for culverts construction projects. Newly updated website by Tri-County Recycling Alliance. Updated color recycling brochures outlined recycling and solid waste drop off locations.

ANTI-LITTERING: Fourteen local groups helped clean litter with the Fiscal Court and Road Department and earned cash during November, 2009 (48 miles cleaned). River Sweep ORSANCO conducted a poster contest in the K-12 public and private schools to promote cleaning up litter from the Ohio River. Prizes were awarded. River Sweep was conducted in June, 2009. Newly updated website. Participated in Commonwealth Cleanup Week and conducted windshield surveys. Road Department and jail inmate work release was used. Radio and television interviews conducted. Community Cleanups were conducted in 3 communities. The trash brochure outlining the county ordinances and the state statutes regarding open burning, littering and the punishment for such crimes was delivered to residents who were found to be in violation of the county's illegal dumping, illegal burning or littering ordinances. Volunteers delivered brochures door-to-door and answered residents' questions face to face.

ANTI-DUMPING: Newly updated website with links to Division of Waste Management's website. Radio and TV interviews with Solid Waste Coordinator to discuss how illegally disposed garbage affects our environment. Commonwealth Cleanup Week advertised. Window surveys conducted. Road Department and jail inmate work release program cleaned along all public roadways, collecting trash from public properties during 2009. This program was provided year-round and helped deter littering and dumping by quickly attacking problem areas.

ENFORCEMENT: Open Burning regulations were handed out which informed residents of what was allowed to be burned and what was not allowed. The update burning restrictions with enhanced definitions of garbage helped to educate residents about not burning plastics. County Attorney and SWC worked to strengthen solid waste enforcement by investigating, documenting, and reporting dumps and sending our letters to offenders. Brochure with county ordinances and the state statutes were distributed. Updated website and links. Commonwealth Cleanup Week and ordinances advertised to bring in illegally dumped trash and tires.

SITING: Newly adopted requirements in 2006 for siting a landfill in Union County were amended by the Fiscal Court. Amendment and modification of the 2006 ordinance provided a clarification of "solid waste" which was presented to the fiscal court and passed in 2009.

Tire Pilot Program

RECYCLING/REDUCTION: Webster City and County schools continued participating in the largest and most extensive school recycling program in the state of Kentucky. Each school was provided a large outdoor school recycling container donated by grant from the Kentucky Division of Waste Management with the Tri County Recycling Alliance. Another grant from the National Recycling Coalition provided can and bottle recycling receptacles containers for each classroom to move the materials inside the school facilities. Schools can now safely store plastics, newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, magazines and office paper for recycling by the Webster County Road Department. Webster County Road Department continued their aggressive cardboard recycling project with containers made by road crew employees and inmates. The program provided cardboard recycling boxes to businesses which were serviced by road department employee on a weekly basis. Cardboard was baled and shipped directly to the International Paper Mill in Webster County. Participating with Henderson, McLean, Union and Webster Counties, the Tri-County Recycling Alliance's School Recycling Program serves approximately 13,000 students. Recycling brochures outlined recycling opportunities for residents at the three compaction centers. Employees at the compaction centers passed the brochures out to residents who use the facilities to promote recycling local efforts. A Pilot Tire Recycling Program sponsored by KY DWM was conducted from January through June. Tires of all sizes were recycled from non retailers and Webster County residents. Advertising for the program was provided by educational brochures, television news coverage, website and radio. Newspapers in Webster County covered all recycling and solid waste issues in the county. The farm pesticide recycling program netted 1,637 lbs of recycling pesticide containers. The county extension office informed farmers of the free program. "The Art of Recycling" art contest and exhibit was conducted by the Ohio Valley Art League and on exhibit for several weeks at the Henderson Fine Arts Center. The county SWC conducted several radio advertisements to promote Commonwealth Cleanup Week and Tire Amnesty program. Inmates provide litter cleanup on public property and along roadsides throughout the year. Webster County Road Department conducted windshield surveys during Commonwealth Cleanup Week in March. Volunteers registered at the road department for cleanup activities.

ANTI-DUMPING: A newly update website details all locations available to the public in Webster County for recycling and solid waste disposal. The county attorney, fiscal court, road department and SWC continue to actively report and enforce illegal dumping laws and provide documentation to the courts and to the State Division of Waste Management. The SWC also conducted several radio and television interviews to explain to residents why illegal dumping and burning of waste harms the environment and what additional enforcement is being taken to prevent illegal dumping.

ENFORCEMENT: The county attorney, fiscal court, road department, sheriff and SWC continue to actively report and enforce illegal dumping laws and provide documentation to the courts and to the State Division of Waste Management. Any illegal dumping or criminal littering offenses which were not addressed by the property owners ended up in court. A newly update website details all locations available to the public in Webster County for recycling and solid waste disposal. The SWC also conducted several radio and television interviews to explain to residents why illegal dumping and burning of waste harms the environment and what additional enforcement is being taken to prevent illegal dumping. Brochures from Division of Air Quality were also distributed to individual households which were caught illegally dumping or burning waste. Articles appeared in local newspapers concerning the no-burn ordinances and State regulations concerning burning.
